lost or ever passed at all. Smith was requested by the mayor to prepare an ordinance and did so. It, however, received the adverse report of Aldermen Purvine and Rosebraugh, majority, and the favorable report of Alderman Simmeral, minority member of the ordinance committee, and the majority report was adopted.

More recently the ordinance again came up and was again killed by indefinite postponement. The new ordinance received the unanimous vote of the eight members who were present, first being read three times under suspension of the rules.

In general, the ordinance follows the state law, but requires that there shall be five members of the commission instead of three and that one member shall be a member of the city council. It is understood the mayor will appoint five members from the following six names: Fred A. Williams, representing the council; Dr. W. Carlton Smith, Dr. H. H. Olinger, Frank W. Durbin, Harry Levy, and Ralph Thompson. The ordinance was composed of Dr. Olinger, Dr. Smith and Frank W. Durbin, Sr.

The ordinance provides that all financial receipts from boxing bouts in excess of what is necessary to pay expenses shall go into a city emergency fund, of which the city treasurer shall be custodian and which shall be expended by the mayor and the city council for charitable purposes, provided that whatever is necessary shall first be paid into a sinking fund which shall be maintained at \$500 for the purpose of financing legalized boxing.

## NO ROAD BONUSES GIVEN THIS YEAR

There will be no two-mill bonus to road districts this year, states County Judge Hunt, due to the fact that all of the money available will be needed in working out the five-year market road program which is just getting under way.

Last year, with the original five-year program completed, there was a period when the court had some excess funds. As a result it announced that it would give a bonus up to two mills to every road district that voted a special tax of two mills or more. As a result about 40 road districts benefited and about \$25,000 was spread about the county in assisting these road districts in their development programs. A large number of districts which failed to take advantage of this situation are beginning to inquire as to whether the court will do the same thing this year, getting ready to take advantage of the bonus. But the court states there will be no more bonuses.
