NEW FRATERNAL HALL WILL OPEN HERE TOMORROW

Tomorrow, Saturday night, the Fraternal Temple association will throw open to its members the recently decorated, rejuvenated and attractively furnished club rooms in the association's temple on South Liberty street formerly occupied by and purchased from the Elks, who are now in their new home on State street.

The association has a membership of 2300 and it is expected that the club rooms will be crowded with members eager to see their quarters with the many material improvements which have been made in them since the association took them over from the Elks.

The Fraternal Temple association consists of five fraternal organizations, the Woodmen of the World, Order of Eagles, United Artisans, Knights of Pythias and Brotherhood of American Yeomen.

The club is maintained exclusively for members of these organizations and friends accompanying them. Members of the American Legion also have been made honorary members.

At a recent meeting the directors of the Fraternal Temple association elected the following officers: L. S. Greer, president; C. E. Albin, vice-president; Lester Jones, secretary; and Theodore Greenbaum, treasurer.

Mr. McAlpin of Albany was chosen manager of the club room for the societies.

Washington School Not Needed; Lincoln Building Is Crowded

Contrary to expectations as outlined early in the summer, the Washington school building will not need to be opened for use at the beginning of the second semester this year, it was stated by Superintendent George Hug this morning. Reason given by Mr. Hug was that the expected grade school enrollment increase in the vicinity of the Washington building has not taken place. There has been a decrease in attendance at Richmond, Garfield, Grant and Highland schools, located in the general vicinity of the Washington, Mr. Hug states.

The only serious congestion among the grades has developed at Lincoln, in the southern part of the city. At that school part of the room has already been taken over as a classroom, as well as a hall room never intended for instructional purposes. Single classes are said to number in some cases more than 50 pupils each, about 20 more than the proper maximum. At present there is considerable talk of putting another teacher at Lincoln and making over a room in the basement of the building for the additional class.

An increase in attendance has also been noted at Englewood. Yew Park remains about the same as last year. Junior high and high school attendance shows a substantial increase.

"We have facilities to take care of the attendance in the north end of the city for the time being," said Supt. Hug this morning. "It is in the southern part where the congestion is growing serious." A considerable increase is expected in the north end of town yet this year, due to the fact that a large portion of the residents there are of the working classes, and it is thought that in many cases the children are still working, some of them not expecting to enter school until after the state fair.

JOHN REED BACK AFTER ABSENCE OF OVER 35 YEARS

John Reed, who has been visiting Mrs. Alexander Clark here for a few days, has seen some vast changes in Salem. He was here 17 years ago, just for a day or two, but it has been fully 35 years or more since he lived in those parts and played with the boys. One, and in fact about the only, real old pal he remembers from his boyhood days is Sheriff Oscar Bower. The sheriff met him on the street yesterday and called him by name, but Reed's face was a blank when it came to recognizing Bower.

"I don't get you," said Reed. "The only man I could possibly know around here that I played with when a kid would be Oscar Bower, and I know that you are not him."

The sheriff let it go at that for a while and then had a hard time convincing Reed that he really was his school boy chum.

Reed used to live in the Waldo hills when a boy, then in Silverton and Salem.

"I was out in the Waldo hills the other day but there are mighty few people out there now that I know when a boy, or that had any recollection of me."

BUNGALOW COURT PROJECT TO COST \$24,000 STARTED

Ralph McCurdy today received a permit from City Recorder Paulsen for a court apartment project on Miller and John streets, to cost \$24,000.

The plans call for a duplex house at 235 Miller street, and six separate bungalows on John street, the latter to be located at the following street numbers on John: 1230, 1238, 1246, 1254, 1262 and 1270.

The duplex house will be designed to accommodate two families and the bungalows one each. Each bungalow will have full basement, furnace, fireplace, electric range and hardwood floors in living rooms, and all of this equipment will be doubled in the duplex house.

The exterior finish will be of wood. All the buildings will overlook the Willamette river.

A concrete driveway will be built with entrance on Miller street and exit on John street.

TAX RECEIPT OF 1866 IS SHOWN

T. L. Davidson, owner of the famous Indian Hill farm in Morning-side just south of the city, possesses a tax receipt of considerable interest. It was made out in 1866 and is the only one of the kind now in existence in the county. It covers 360 acres. This land now just adjoins the city of Salem and taxes on it at that time amounted to a total of \$22.56, the valuation on the real estate being placed at \$1920 and on personal property at \$525. Just what the valuation of this same land would be now has not been figured out, but it would run into a heavy figure and taxes would probably be considerably over the total valuation of the property at that time.

The farm was originally homesteaded by James Davidson in 1847, and that this early pioneer had a good eye for the future as well as for a beautiful location and fine land is indicated in the farm he selected. Incidentally James Davidson when he came out here in covered wagon days brought with him \$11,000 in gold, making him probably the wealthiest man in the territory at that time.
