COUNCIL MEETS AT FALLS CITY

Falls City, Or., Sept. 26.—At the regular meeting of the city council, held Monday night, the usual routine of business was taken up. The marshal reported the completion of the new steps at the hill to the grade school and received a vote of thanks for the good work done. A report was made of the excellent showing by the fair committees appointed by the commercial, both in handling the local community fair and in the special exhibit made at the Polk county fair, and was accepted by the council and a vote of thanks was extended to the committee and others assisting them. The city appropriated \$20 toward the expense incurred in the local fair and in taking the exhibit to Dallas. City Treasurer H. M. Smith made a gift of \$25, his salary as treasurer, for the same purpose, and the auditor was instructed to draw the warrants accordingly.

SILVERTON TO BE IMPROVED

Silverton, Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The beauty of Silverton's natural park is to be enhanced, according to the report submitted by the park commission to the city council and accepted by the latter body. For the past six months the commission has been in consultation with landscape gardeners for the improvement of the park. The plans are now completed. The Silverton park contains about five acres of fire and oak trees. On one side it is bounded by Liberty hill and on the east side runs Silver creek. A year ago a swimming pool was built into the creek. Cement steps for seating purposes were built along the banks. Dressing rooms and showers were added. Besides these additions comfort stations, a tennis court, which is also used for dancing and roller skating, a children's wading pool are among the other improvements added during the past year. The new plans call for the planting of 1378 shrubs of various kinds, the erection of a new speaker's and bandstand, a side hill seating arrangement and a number of scenic walks and paths. The park was a donation of the Coolidge & McClaine estate.

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FALLS CITY MEN BUY STORE AT GRAND RONDE

HEALTH PROGRAM FOR SILVERTON PLANNED

Silverton, Sept. 26.—A health program is being outlined at Silverton for the coming winter. During the past years much duplicated work has been done in this line and it is now the desire of the various civic organizations to combine in such a manner that the work may be taken care of in a more unified way to do away with much waste of time and effort. With this in view the heads of the various civic organizations of Silverton held a meeting this week to discuss ways and means of combining for the purpose of backing the Marion county health program for this community. A local program will also be carried out. A committee composed of Robert E. Goetz, superintendent of Silverton schools, Clifford Rue, president of the Delbert Reeves post of the American Legion, and Seth Bebe, has been chosen to call another meeting and arrange for the election of an executive body to head the new federation.
