Woman's Club Hears Talk On Art

Augmenting the general impression that the Salem Woman's club is opening one of the most promising years in its twenty-five years of its experience, was the result of the second interesting and inspirational club meeting which was held in the clubhouse on Saturday afternoon.

During the program Miss Eleanor Statter, art librarian in Portland, gave a valuable talk on "American Art," covering American architecture, sculpture, and painting. This use of many pictures in illustrating the various points added to the interest of the lecture.

The opening lecture of the course in design which will be offered here this winter by Prof. M. B. Zane, member of the University of Oregon extension division, under the sponsorship of the Salem Arts league, will be given on Thursday evening in the public library beginning at seven o'clock and lasting two hours. University credit will be given for satisfactory work in the course. Registration may be effected through Miss Vivian Hargrave, registration chairman, or Dr. Mary C. Rowland, president of the Salem league.

The course will include a number of home problems of great practical value and is designed to develop creative power along five definite lines as follows: 1. Clear comprehension. 2. Coordination of eye and hand. 3. Self confidence. 4. Technical excellence in line, form and tone. 5. Originality. The first lecture will be taken up with a discussion of theory and practice design and theory and color. Pen, pencil and brush will be used and there will be some homework for the class members. A study of modern color theory will be included in the course and there will be much emphasis on the development of the individual color sense and the cultivation of good color taste. Classes will be held regularly on Thursday evenings.

A word picture of the spirit of federation was so vividly and convincingly painted by Mrs. Saldie Orr-Dunbar, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs in an address before Portland Sororists at its first meeting Thursday as to kindle an enthusiasm for the federation and its projects such as the club has probably never before witnessed, as manifested by its unanimous pledge of \$500 toward the endowment of a bed in the Deerebecher memorial hospital for children and the making of tentative plans for contributions to the scholarship loan fund and the endowment fund.

Mrs. Dunbar said in part: "The spirit of federation reflects love for a cause and for each other, companionship, the inspiration of many minds thinking along similar lines, cultural opportunities, ability to stand for a principle, yet tolerance for the viewpoint and convictions of others and willingness at all times to submit to the will of the majority; it reflects willingness to give as well as to take, the courage to stand fast in the face of criticism, cooperation in work, study and play, the creation of public opinion, unity in activity, fidelity, loyalty, fairness, sincerity, charity, efficiency and service to the great of these elements in the spirit of federation is service—service without thought of self and without thought of return." Mrs. Dunbar then spoke of the several projects of the federation and urged the club to give these first consideration in making their plans for the year. She explained the new score card plan for club achievement along federation lines.—Oregon Journal.

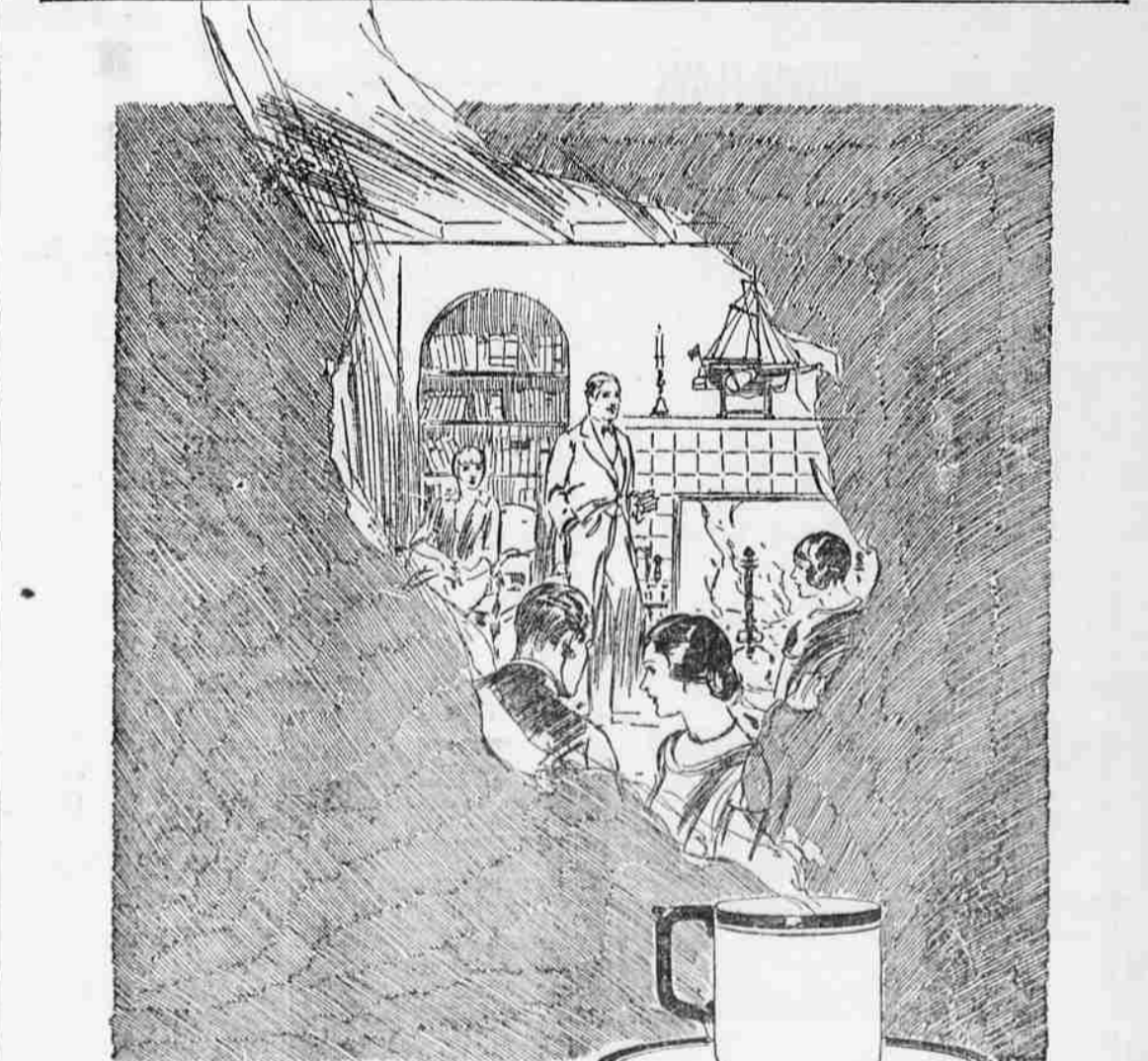
