

SENATORS TAKE THIRD CONTEST FROM ALBANY 2-0

The Salem Senators won from the Albany nine yesterday afternoon by a score of 2 to 0. The Albany team had won the other two games in hard fought battles by scores of 4 to 3 and 3 to 4. Besides pitching a one-hit game, Barham allowed no man to get to first on a free ticket.

The Senators scored their first run in the second inning. Keene got a hit and stole second and scored on a hit by Louis Glead. Edwards was robbed of a hit when Hecker jumped high in the air and grabbed a hit line drive. The Albany nine got two men on base in the second inning. Patterson was safe on Quayle's error. Davis fanned. Hecker hit to Quayle who threw Patterson out at second but Hecker was safe at first when the ball went past Keene. Keene retrieved the ball and tagged Hecker out on the hidden ball trick.

In the third frame the Albany nine got their only hit of the game when Jackson got a hit and went to second on a sacrifice. That was as far as he was able to get as Barham struck out the next two men. The other Salem tally came in the sixth inning. Green got a hit and stole second. Proctor struck out but Keene got a two-base hit and Green scored.

The rest of the game was hard fought with neither side having much advantage. The Senators had two men on base in the eighth but were unable to score. Quayle, sixteen year old boy played short for the Senators and played excellent ball. The first chance came in the first inning when the second man hit a hard liner to him. He made a beautiful stop of the hit and threw him out. Two other times he made good stops. Teters, Mt. Angel star played third base for the locals in place of Maples. Teters is a regular shortstop, never playing the hot corner before in his life. He made one error but came up with several nice stops. Louis Glead, former Salem high school player played excellent ball and got two nice singles. The first single scored the first Salem tally.

The Senators are to cross bats with the Brooks all-stars on the local diamond next Sunday. Edwards will probably have the same stars in the game as he did yesterday.

WILBUR FLAYS SHIP CAPTAIN

Washington, Sept. 26.—(A. P.)—The steamship City of Rome should have remained on the spot unless urgently impelled to leave after ramming the submarine S-51 last night, Secretary Wilbur declared today.

The conduct of the captain of the City of Rome, the secretary added, would be inquired into in connection with the investigation which would be ordered, and if it were found that there had been any criminal act or negligence on his part, action would be taken against him.

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LAST OF SCHOOL CLUBS DISBAND BY BOARD ORDER

With official notice handed in yesterday to J. C. Nelson, high school principal, that the Julius Caesar and Amende clubs of the high school have ceased to exist, the final episode of the story of secret societies at Salem high school is considered to have closed. The Amende club had not been required to disband, but upon the initiative of its members it volunteered to disband.

"Each and every one of these organizations has disbanded voluntarily, with absolutely no pressure being brought to bear from the outside," said Mr. Nelson this morning. Both clubs that disbanded Friday handed in written statements, signed by all active members.

A reorganization of other clubs among the students has been effected. Mr. Nelson announced. The Snikpon dramatic society, which had been considered in some ways nearly on a par with the 7 clubs disapproved by the school board, has been placed upon an absolutely new basis, the faculty advisor, Miss Ethel McGilchrist, selecting each new member on the basis of ability and industry along dramatic lines. In former years new members have been taken in only by vote of the club. The membership, which has been placed at 24, will probably remain about the same, but may be changed at the discretion of the faculty advisor.

In the future the society will be on a basis similar to an athletic team," said Superintendent Hug this morning. "Only a certain number can be handled, and only a certain number will be allowed to belong, but everyone will have an equal opportunity to try out for it, and selection will not be based upon anything except how hard a student works and what ability he shows."

Other organizations will operate on exactly the same basis, school authorities state. Even the Hi-Y club, a Y. M. C. A. organization operating in the high school, has been notified that from now on it will not be entitled to limit its membership at its own discretion.

SPECIAL PROSECUTOR NAMED IN KELSEO CASE

Olympia, Wash., Sept. 26.—(A. P.)—Appointment of Assistant Attorney General R. G. Sharpe as a special prosecutor in the case of the murder of Thomas Dorey, Kelseo editor, was announced here today by Attorney General John H. Dunbar.

Other than to state that he would go to Kelseo Monday morning to commence his investigation into the case, Mr. Sharpe said he had no statement to make.

DEBT DISCUSSED ACROSS TEACUPS BY NEGOTIATORS

Washington, Sept. 23.—(A. P.)—The American and French war debt negotiators have adopted a policy of discussing the differences over the teacups.

With the formal negotiations at a standstill over the week-end, Secretary Mellon today accepted an invitation to lunch with M. Caillaux and others of the French commission at the French embassy.

The function was arranged as the first of a series of daily lunches at which the principals in the

negotiations will seek the common ground of understanding they have not thus far discovered in the more formal exchanges of the conference room.

M. Caillaux apparently found the new method of negotiating more to his taste than the somewhat sharp passages through which the discussions have passed since they began two days ago. He had made no effort last night to

conceal his disappointment at the tenor of the American reply to his first proposal of settlement, but today he seemed more cheerful.

While the French have been informed that their offer of an initial payment of \$25,000,000 with graduated increases over a long period, was wholly inadequate in the American view, the memorandum presented by Mr. Mellon was represented as not to be construed

as in any sense a counter-proposal. Thus the way is left open for further settlement suggestions from the French and it appeared today

that the next move rested with them.

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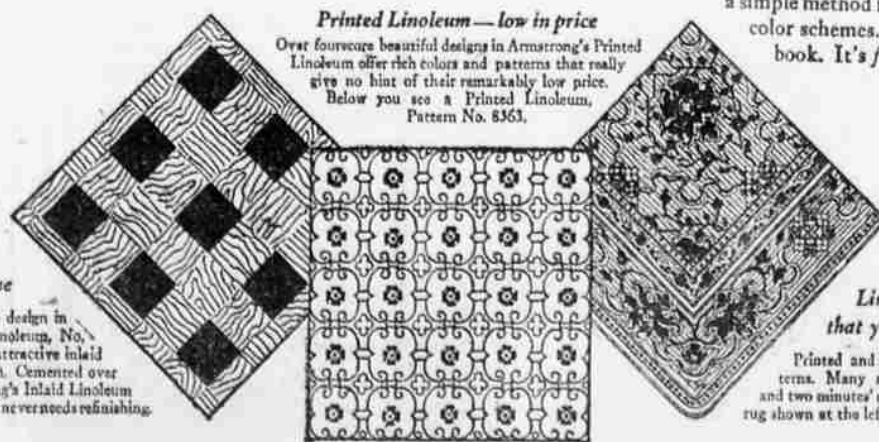


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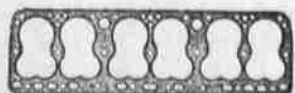
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
