

BLACK CHERRY BOOM LIKELY

SHARP ADVANCE REGISTERED IN EARLY TRADING

Chicago, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Six cents a bushel sudden jump in the price of September delivery of wheat formed an interesting feature of grain trading today. The fact that this was the last day for settlement of September wheat contracts was responsible for the quick advance, which carried the September price up to \$1.43 1/2, as compared with \$1.37 1/2 to \$1.37 3/4 at yesterday's finish. A swift reaction followed, wiping out most of the gain.

At the end of the day September wheat showed 1/2¢ to 1 1/4¢ decline as compared with yesterday's finish. The close today was \$1.36 1/2 to \$1.37, an extreme fall of 7¢ a bushel from today's top level.

Wheat closed nervous, 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ net lower, May \$1.37 1/2 to \$1.38 and December \$1.40 1/2 to \$1.40 3/4.

Corn closed weak, 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ net lower, December 75 1/2¢ to 78 1/2¢.

BUTTER, EGGS MAKE ADVANCES; POULTRY FIRM

Portland, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Butter and egg quotations are higher in local exchange for the day with the market showing a firm undertone. Offerings of fresh stocks are light in both commodities and the demand good with a broad shipping outlet.

Extra grade eggs are up two cents at 45¢, while prime firsts and pullets are each posted a cent higher at 43¢ and 38¢ respectively. Peewees and current receipts continue steady and unchanged.

In the butter market, prime firsts are marked up a half cent at 49 cents. Extras remain firm at 52 cents with standards at 50 cents. Prints are moving out at the 52 cent level with fat worth 52 cents, f. o. b. shipper's track in zone 1. Production is showing very little increase for this time of year. Buyers are paying 17 1/2 to 18 cents for choice light cream and hogs along the street.

The market is firm on country seal and pork with receipts very light. Commission men look for an increase in receipts to start this week as the cooler weather is more favorable to shippers.

Shipments of live poultry to this market are falling off and are showing an upward trend. Light hens are firm at 16 cents; heavy hens cleaning up at 25 cents; springers selling from 25 to 28 cents; young white Pekin ducks around 25 cents.

Sir William Joynson Hicks, Home Secretary of Great Britain, has intimated his delight that the United States has barred Shapurji Saklatvala, Communist Member of Parliament. Ruth Tabor, known in Chicago as "Silver Dollar" Tabor, daughter of a former United States Senator from Colorado, died mysteriously of burns. A realty broker has been held pending an inquiry. Wayne B. Deal for the land is now under way, the orchard to be located in the Macleay district on the Harvey Taylor place, which is being sold to the syndicate for the purpose.

At present time 56 acres of the land is in full sale, another 56 acres in summer fallow and the balance in stubble.

Among the heavier stockholders in the new enterprise, besides those mentioned are Lloyd Haggolds, Harvey Taylor and the Taylor and estate, aside from a number of smaller ones. So far 20 shares at \$1050 apiece have been subscribed for. It is the plan at this time

to sell 24 shares, which will pay for the land, put in the trees and take care of the first year's cultivation, the meantime it is probable some additional stock may be sold.

At first the plan was to put in a few hedges in the orchard, but this has been changed to make it exclusively a Lambert planting as this is the cherry in big demand for fresh fruit shipment.

O. E. Brooks and George Vick, actively interested in the new planting, have also been among the main factors in the Salem Black Cherry association, which has successfully handled for two years fresh black cherry shipments from here and the success of the association has had considerable bearing in the plan for promoting the big Macleay cherry orchard project.

Mr. Brooks states that the Taylor land is ideally situated and adapted to the purpose of the new organization and he is satisfied that a wonderful producing orchard can be developed on it.

200 Acre Orchard of Lambert Cherries To Be Planted at Macleay

"Lambert" orchards is the name of the immense Lambert cherry planting which will be put out by a syndicate of local men, headed by George Vick and O. E. Brooks. The orchards, now virgin land as far as fruit is concerned, will include over 200 acres planted entirely to Lambert cherry trees, the produce to be used entirely in the fresh shipping market as it develops, according to present plans.
