

# HI SCHOOL GRID SQUAD DEFEATS ALUMNI 7 TO 6

The Salem high school football team defeated the alumni team Saturday afternoon in a hard fought game played on the high school field when the red and black eleven walked off with the long end of a 7 to 6 score.

The high school eleven displayed a formidable aggregation and gave promise of being the hardest high school team to beat in the state. Salem scored first, putting over a touchdown in the first quarter, when Blako, new man from Parrieh junior high, intercepted a pass and ran from midfield for a touchdown. Temple converted the free kick. The alumni scored their touchdown in the final quarter when Hagerdon recovered a Salem fumble on the alumni 8-yard line and ran the length of the field to within six yards of the Salem line, when he stumbled from exhaustion. Patterson bucked the ball across the line on the next play but was unable to kick goal.

# MENNONITES MOVING TO MEXICAN COLONY

Winnipeg, Oct. 2.—After migrating to Canada from Germany because their religion opposes military service, 6000 German Mennonites will soon have moved on again, this time to Mexico. The exodus began in 1921, and the last few members of the colony are now ready to leave.

The colony in Mexico comprises 100,000 acres, where the sect has been permitted by the Mexican government to establish its own schools, speak German, and manage its own internal affairs. The Mennonites were also exempted from military service.

Mennonites from Russia are taking the lands which the Germans are leaving in Canada.

# BIG AUTO TURNS OVER; NONE HURT

Chenawah, Oct. 5.—Charles H. Reed and wife of Portland, escaped uninjured when their big sedan turned over in the ditch on the Pacific highway near here at 6 o'clock this morning. Mr. Reed was driving from Portland to Salem. The fog made it hard to see. The car was being driven at a moderate speed when a lighter car driven by an unknown driver coming from Salem passed him without any lights. The smaller car was cutting in and the Reed car was forced over on the side of the road, the car turning completely around and over when Mr. Reed applied the brakes.

The lighter car did not stop after forcing the Portland machine off of the road. Mr. Reed and wife climbed out of the car as soon as they could get righted. The car was nearly new, having been driven only a short time. It was not damaged it is thought, except for a few broken windows and bent fenders.

# QUALITY YARN SPUN BY MILES LINEN PLANT

Quantity output of the finished product of the Miles Linen company, the pioneer in Salem's nascent industry, begins this week. Operators of the various machines at the plant have been in gradual process of training for more than a month, and some 1500 pounds of yarn, from which the twine is made, is now on hand. Once the final machine, which twists the yarn into twine, gets to running full speed, officials of the company believe that the daily output of the mill will be approximately 250 pounds a day.

About 5 pounds of twine have been produced for sample purposes, some going to the state fair for display there, and some being asked by a large firm with a view to making a purchase. The sample for purchase, the first to be submitted by the local firm, was made last Saturday.

An "open house" is to be staged within a few weeks, everyone in Salem being invited to view the plant in operation.

Officials of the company declare that the "yarn is proving to be very strong and even, with practically no lumpy places." The yarn consists of fine threads, which are twisted in number anywhere from 6 to 14 into a single thread of twine. The twine is dove up in balls weighing one pound each. The product is used for weaving fish nets and in other places where an unusually strong, durable thread is demanded.

Patrick Clark, who had charge of installing the machinery of the plant, left some 19 days ago for his home in Ireland. The other two Irishmen, Bertram Thompson and

J. S. McNeil, who assisted in the installation, are still working at the mill.

A modern, lighting and heating system is being completed this week.
