

JOHNSON FACES MEADOWS FOR OPENING GAME

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 6.—(A. P.)—The hopes of two champion baseball clubs have been placed in the arms of right handed pitcher Stanley Harris, youthful manager of the Washington Senators, has announced Walter Johnson as the choice for the opening game of the world's series at 2 p. m. tomorrow, while Bill McKechnie, Pirate leader, has nominated Lee Meadows and Vic Aldrich for the opening two innings.

McKechnie has not decided upon the order of his moundmen's appearance and Harris, although optimistic, conveyed doubt as to the ability of Stanley Coveleski to assume the burden in the second encounter. Yet, all indications point to a clash between Johnson and Meadows on opening day, to be followed by a Coveleski-Aldrich duel, leaving third game rivalry to the sturdy left handers of the clubs, Dutch Reuther of the Senators and Emil Yde, youthful Pirate.

In case of rain Ray Kroner, Pacific coast man of might, may go to the firing line for Pittsburgh tomorrow, or perhaps Aldridge will be the selection. If Meadows appears in the box it will be the first time in any world's series that a bespectacled pitcher has taken the mound.

COTTAGE FARM TO BE IMPROVED

Several repairs and alterations were authorized by the state board of control yesterday for the state cottage farm, a part of the state insane hospital, as an elimination of fire hazards. A dry kiln is to be removed from the basement of one of the buildings and placed in a separate structure to be built for the purpose. A contract for a new smokestack for which the legislature appropriated \$1200 was awarded to the Kinross Iron Works of Portland at \$623.

The board authorized the purchase of a marking machine for the laundry at the main building, which will cost \$123. Construction of a garage to house the automobiles of employees at the cottage farm was authorized. It will house about 20 cars. Farmers who have complained that drains from septic tanks at the cottage farm run across their land were afforded relief when the board authorized Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent, to dig ditches to carry the water across state-owned land.

FAVOR COUNTY AGENT FOR POLK

Dallas, Or., Oct. 6.—The Dallas chamber of commerce voted unanimously Monday noon in favor of providing for an extension agent in Polk county on the next budget. The vote is part of a referendum being taken on the proposition by the member organizations of the Polk County Federated clubs. It followed discussion of the subject at luncheon by H. C. Seymour of Corvallis, state club work leader. Next Monday the club will take a referendum on the county nurse plan.

WASHINGTON RELICS SOLD

New York, Oct. 6.—A collection of Washington relics including 150 letters in the handwriting of the first president, has been sold to the Rosenbach company. The collector, who disposed of them was said to be a New York banker, whose ancestors were contemporaries of Washington.

The collection, which included between 400 and 500 papers relating to Washington's activities during the Revolutionary period, has been valued by dealers at between \$50,000 and \$65,000. Among the letters is one written June 2, 1777, to Lord Cornwallis protesting against the killing of a young American lieutenant. Another written in 1797 to Mrs. Elizabeth Powell and dictated by Martha Washington, reveals an "unagreement" among Washington and several contemporaries to live until 1800.

Others of the more personal letters describe Washington's plans for home brewing from 500 barrels of corn a year.

"Dear Sir:—I have the honor to ask if you will mind favoring me with an answer to the following questions:

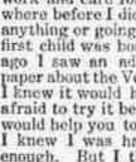
- "Are divorces easy to get in your state?"

FRENCH RESUME DRIVE ON RIFFS

Fes, French Morocco, Oct. 6.—(A. P.)—The fears of yesterday that the heavy rainfall might cause a cessation in the French operations against the Rifian tribesmen proved baseless, for today a hot sun was rapidly drying off the roads. The downpour was really of benefit to the French, as it put some water in the beds of the previously dried up brooks.

The troops today again are under way after the brief breathing spell provided them by the inclement weather. In the Kifane region the advanced troops resumed their march up the valleys of the Ouzzer and Choula and are progressing rapidly toward Aboucmass. They are being well received by the inhabitants and are now barely 25 miles from the sea. Simultaneously another force began an attack 30 miles further east.
