## IMPEACHMENT OF SILVERTON BOARD SOUGHT

Silverton, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The city council met in regular session Monday night for the first time in the new city hall. The business attracting the most attention was the petition read to impeach W. L. Cunningham and S. E. Richardson on the water board for raising the salary of the water commissioner, A. Jantz, from \$150 to \$200 a month. The increase was made last spring. It is reported that some complaint was made during the summer but the matter was referred to the water commission. A. Digness, one of the members of the commission, wished to keep the salary at \$150. It is said, while Mr. Richardson and Mr. Cunningham over-ruled Mr. Digness. The petition presented Monday night was signed by J. Stalker.

The pool hall men of Silverton appeared before the council Monday night for information about the partition which a law demands must be placed between the lunch counters and bars, and the card tables of pool halls. This law will be enforced at Silverton. No objection was raised Monday night by the pool hall men. They appeared before the council merely for purposes of information.

The West Main street paving assessment was passed upon on the third reading. The street will be open to traffic in a little over two weeks.

A resolution was also passed to improve Pine street from James avenue to Brown street. The street will be graded this fall and paved next spring. Pine street is a continuation of the Salem-Silverton highway.

Reports on the repairing of sidewalks were also read showing that a number of new sidewalks were being built in Silverton following orders issued by the council.

It was decided that the formal opening and dedication of the new city hall at Silverton will be held on the afternoon and evening of October 14. The hall is very nearly completed.

**WORK OF PAVING HIGHWAY STRIP IS COMMENCED**  
Preliminary work for the paving of the Pacific Highway Grade between Oregon City and Canemah started Monday morning when the Oregon Contract company put a crew of men to work laying pipe line and attending to other initial details at the Canemah end, says the Oregon City Enterprise. Today the work of scarifying will begin preparatory to the placing of the cement. The highway will remain open to traffic for some time yet as it is the plan to pave one-half of the grade at a time and the work will start on the bluff side of the highway and continue to a point near the top of the grade.

One way traffic will be routed through and the construction company will place flagmen at either ends as the work progresses to direct the motorists so that there will be no difficulty on the grade. When the cement is completed to the top of the grade or to the point where it is planned to begin putting down concrete curbs and sidewalk toward Oregon City the work will be taken back to the Canemah end of the grade and the other half of the concrete put down. When this part of the construction is reached it will be necessary for motorists southbound to leave the highway at the end of the completed strip of pavement and detour to High street thence to the old South End road which comes out at New Era and northbound motorists must leave the highway at New Era and come into Oregon City over the old South End road and High street. As the paving operations progress and the hard surface is completed even with the first strip the construction company will begin the paving of the side of the highway next to the railroad tracks leading towards Oregon City. When this is completed and the work started on the second strip motorists will be forced to detour up Singer hill and down High street to the old South End road and the highway will be barricaded at Fifth street. It is estimated that this condition will exist for a period of about 20 days.
