PIONEER OF '52 DIES AT SIDNEY

Sidney, Oct. 8.—The death of George M. Marlatt, pioneer resident of Sidney, occurred Thursday noon at the family home. Mr. Marlatt was born in Missouri November 19, 1851, and crossed the plains to Oregon with his parents when but six months of age.

The family settled upon the farm now owned by the Marlatt family and there Mr. Marlatt grew to manhood. On November 14, 1878, he was united in marriage with Catherine Clayton and to this union two children were born, George H. and Eva J. Mr. Marlatt had been in failing health for some time, but his condition wasn't deemed alarming and his sudden death on Thursday was an intense shock to his family and friends.

Funeral services were held at the home Saturday at 1 p. m. Members of the Odd Fellows lodge with which body Mr. Marlatt had been identified for fifty-three years were in charge of the services. He leaves to mourn his departure, his widow Mrs. Catherine Marlatt, one daughter, Mrs. Eva Dumas of Berkeley, Cal., one son, George H. of Sidney and one grandson, Lloyd Marlatt also of Sidney. Interment was made in the family plot in the Cox cemetery near Sidney.
