MINOR POINTS OF SECURITY PACT RATIFIED

Germany and Allies Agree Upon All Clauses Except Poland and League of Nations.

Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 10.—(A. P.)—The German and allied statements today approved in second reading the majority of the points in the draft of the security pact, but left for consideration of Monday the two main outstanding questions, first the conditions of Germany's entrance into the league of nations and second, France's special guarantee for Poland.

Lloyd Sentenced To Hang Nov 30 For Baun Murder

Dallas, Oct. 10.—W. R. Lloyd, 26, of Cottage Grove, was sentenced to be hanged on Monday, November 30, at 10 A. M., by Circuit Judge W. M. Hanney at 9 A. M., Saturday for the murder of Miss I. Baun on the night of September 1 in an attempted hold-up and robbery after he had hired Baun to drive him to Albany.

Rome, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Donatello Torrigiani, grand master of the Masonic order in Italy, today issued an order to all lodges to hold no meetings and cease all work until further notice. His action follows the recent fascist-Masonic clashes at Florence, in which several persons were killed.

PORTLAND PURCHASES THREE ATHLETIC PLAYERS

Portland, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Purchase of three players from the Philadelphia Athletics was announced today by President Thomas L. Turner of the Portland club of the Pacific coast baseball league. William Bagwell, outfielder and first baseman, who was with Portland early in the present season, but who had to return to Philadelphia under a ruling by Commissioner Landis is one of the acquisitions. They are Marvin Smith, shortstop and Tom Glass, right handed pitcher. Commissioner Landis ruled early this year that as Bagwell had been drafted by Philadelphia he must either be retained by the Athletics a year or be returned to the team from which he was drafted.

CLEAR NORRIS IN MURDER CASE

Kelso, Wash., Oct. 10.—(A. P.)—George R. Norris, city manager of Kelso, was completely exonerated today of charges preferred against him by former Mayor A. Rurie Todd, of conspiracy in connection with the death of Thomas Dewey, Kelso editor, who was shot June 19. R. G. Sharpe, assistant attorney general, this morning issued a statement declaring that evidence produced was insufficient to justify filing an information against Norris. Judge Homer Kirby of the superior court, issued an order releasing Norris from \$40,000 bail.
