## Woman's Club Adopts New Plan

The organization of a finance committee and the adoption of the departmental plan were among the most important items of business considered and acted upon at the meeting of the Salem Woman's club in the club house on Saturday afternoon.

Because the club is growing too large to allow the executive board to continue to act as an advisory board in financial matters, the plan of having a finance committee to assume the duties was acted upon during the business meeting. Mrs. Wm. Fordyce Fargo, president of the club, appointed as members of the new committee Mrs. Charles S. Weller, chairman, Mrs. Ray Farmer, Mrs. Edith Hazard, Mrs. L. H. McManis and Miss Ethel Fletcher. Mrs. O. E. Price, treasurer, is ex-officio member. The committee will consider the bills presented to the club and the best ways for the spending of the club money but the final vote will remain with the club as a whole.


The second reading of the proposed departmental plan was given by Mrs. W. E. Kirk and by unanimous vote the club adopted the plan which was suggested by the federation president more than a year ago. According to the new plan the institutions, health, fine arts and visiting committees will be enlarged into departments on the order of the state organization. The personnel of the new departments will be announced by the club president within a few days. A new department will be the American home department.

Alternates to attend the county federation meeting in Hubbard to take the place of several delegates who will not be able to attend will also be named by Mrs. Fargo within a short time. During the business meeting Mrs. Elmo S. White, general chairman of the committee arranging for the scholarship loan silver tea on Friday, gave a short talk on the purpose of the tea. Mrs. J. A. Carson reported the health convention held in Portland last week. During the meeting of the executive board preceding the regular meeting even applications for membership in the club were considered. Mrs. T. S. Roberts was in charge of the music for the afternoon.

Miss Jessie McGregor, formerly chairman of the state scholarship loan committee, was the main speaker of the afternoon. She told of the manner in which worthy girls are allowed to finish their college courses through financial aid given them by the women's club fund. Last year six girls at Willamette were given loans, according to Miss McGregor. She was the guest of the scholarship loan committee of the club.

The Court street Christian Endeavor met for the monthly business meeting Friday evening at the church. Reports of committees were presented. Plans for the coming month were made, among them being a contest held on the four square campaign for the purpose of increasing membership in the Endeavor. The question of an Endeavor library was also discussed. After the adjournment of the business meeting, the remainder of the evening was spent in playing games.
