

ANNA ROSE LOSES \$20,000 DAMAGE SUIT IN INJURIES

Dallas, Oct. 14—A verdict in favor of the defendant, S. C. Kinne of Dallas, was returned by a jury in Judge Ramsey's court at 5 o'clock Tuesday in the \$20,000 damage suit brought by Anna Rose of Portland. The jury was out about two hours.

Miss Rose sought heavy damages as a result of an auto accident in Portland December 25, 1924, in which she was knocked down by Kinne's car. She claimed that the accident had made her a permanent invalid. The defense, conducted by Oscar Haxter, brought out the fact that Miss Rose's physical and nervous condition was a result of illness of long standing.

It also established the fact that Kinne had rendered assistance, employed a physician at his own expense and disputed the contention that he had been traveling without lights, and at an excessive speed.

The defense, conducted by Oscar Haxter, scored heavily in cross examination of Mrs. Lucia Winnett of Vancouver, Washington, and Mrs. Fannie Nichols of Portland, when they admitted that they had prompted Miss Rose during her testimony on the witness stand by shaking of the head and nodding to indicate the trend of her replies.

BIRD SEASON OPENS THURSDAY

Hundreds of hunters are awaiting the break of dawn tomorrow morning when the open season for hunting Chinese pheasants in all parts of Oregon will begin. The season is from October 15 to October 31 inclusive.

Not only may Chinese pheasants be killed during the open season but sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasants may also be killed. Bag limit, four of any such birds in one day, or eight during any consecutive seven days; provided that not more than two female Chinese pheasants may be killed in any seven consecutive days.

Though the "Chinese" are reported as being extremely scarce this year, many local hunters will shoulder their double-barreled, automatic or pump shotguns and embark for their favorite hunting grounds. The fields around Independence, Lebanon, Eugene and other Willamette valley points will be the annual mecca for the nimble, scores of hunters expecting to be out with the first streak of light in the east.

The highways affected by the order are: Astoria Highway, Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, Corvallis-Newport highway, Crater Lake highway, Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, McMinnville-Tillamook highway, Mt. Hood Loop, Prineville-Lakeview highway, Redwood highway, Rosevelt Coast highway, The Dalles-California highway, Willamette highway, Willamette valley-Florence highway.

The reduction in maximum load is from 22,000 to 16,000 pounds and the maximum weight of 600 pounds for tires having a width in excess of 30 inches is reduced to 450 pounds per inch tire width, and the maximum for tires having width of less than 30 inches is reduced from 500 pounds to 375 pounds per inch of tire width.

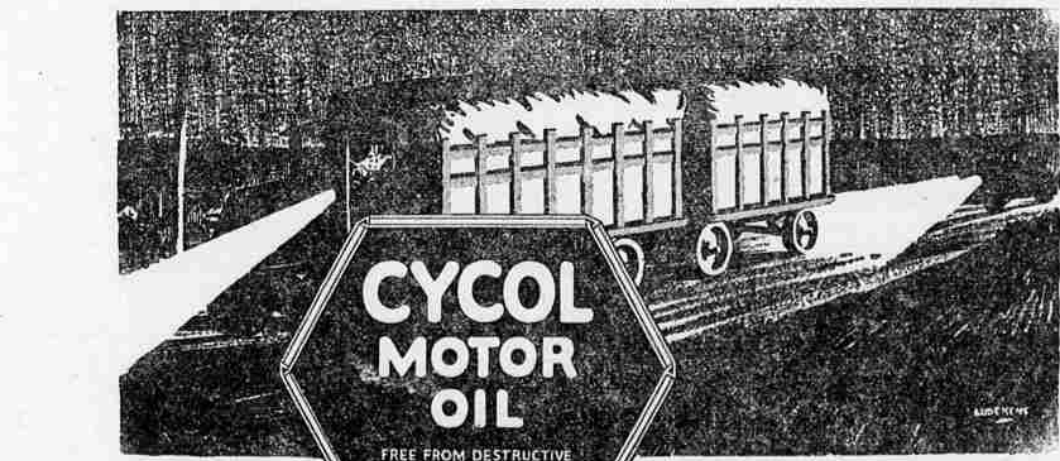
