

RUM VESSELS FLOCK TO FLORIDA TO WET TOURISTS

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 14.—(A. P.)—Rum row, that moveable mart for illicit trade in forbidden beverages, is now more or less firmly established in southern waters. Present activities there are so extensive it is believed that the trade includes most of those former operators who managed to escape the sharp-shooting coast guard's campaign to break up flourishing business of Boston, New York and Atlantic City shores.

Rum runners have accepted literally the admonition of Colonel Luke Lea of Tennessee to "come south, young fellow," paraphrasing from Horace Greeley's famous advice to young men.

And they have come—fleets of them. Many have been lured to Florida by tales of fabulous riches and of an orgy of spending by winter tourists. Others have been driven to Florida by Uncle Sam's intense efforts in other southern waters.

Three branches of America's coast service are represented in Florida by Colonel H. L. Simmons, retired army officer, state prohibition administrator; Commander J. F. Hambach, retired navy officer, his assistant, and Captain John G. Berry, active commander of the coast guard forces.

Colonel Simmons has set up headquarters at Tampa with branch offices at Miami, Jacksonville and Pensacola. Key West is headquarters for the coast guard. Commander Hambach has discovered that a gigantic English rum running syndicate is operating in Florida waters. In the syndicate's fleet are ships carrying cargoes of 15,000 to 20,000 cases, valued at \$500,000 and retailed in Florida for \$1,500,000. There are seven vessels—six schooners and a converted yacht—in the fleet, which keeps its supplies replenished by fast motor boats capable of outdistancing any craft in the coast guard service.

WILLARD DAY PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS ARE MADE

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, has sent out to the schools of the state suggested programs for Frances E. Willard day, which will be observed in the schools of Oregon, the fourth Friday of October. In the foreword, Mr. Churchill says:

"For more than a quarter of a century Frances E. Willard devoted all of her time and energy to bring about social conditions such as would make the world a more tolerable place in which to live. The results of her labors have been embodied in the 18th amendment to the constitution of the United States. The legislature of Oregon has set apart the fourth Friday in October of each year as a day for instruction and appropriate exercises in commemoration of the life, history and achievement of Frances E. Willard. This should be made a day for teaching respect for law and order, for inculcating in the minds of the youth a love and reverence for the protective and beneficent influences of the laws of our land. What is taught today in our public schools will become the established order for tomorrow."

HAND AND FOOT OF CHILD FOUND BY DOG

Everett, Wash., Oct. 14.—An investigation is being made today by Deputy Coroner Stowell, Challacombe, following the finding of the hand and foot of a child by a dog in brush at Swans Trail, a neighborhood a few miles southeast of here. In the opinion of a physician they belonged to a child five or six years old. The hand gives evidence of having been burned. The fragments were brought to the police station this morning by a neighbor of the farmer whose dog found them.

BIG ELECTRIC SIGN ERECTED HEILIG THEATER

An electric sign containing 800 electric light bulbs and measuring 29 feet in height and 5 1/2 feet in width, being installed by the Heilig theater, will be completed this week, it was announced yesterday by Archie Holt, resident manager of the theater. "The sign will be the biggest electric sign ever built in Salem," he said.

It will be equipped with an electric flasher with 5 special circuits, each of which can be flashed on and off intermittently at will, subject to change from night to night or week to week, as desired.

At the start the letters H-E-I-L-I-G, running down the center of the sign, will remain on steadily. They may later be changed to flash on and off. The border, running around the edge of the sign, will flash on and off, each side alternating, with one side being bright part of the time and the other dark, and vice versa. A circle at the top of the sign will have its lights flash on and off in such a way as to give the effect of a circular motion. A huge star inside the circle will flash on and off.

The sign was built by three local electric firms, working together. It is being installed at the north east corner of the I. O. O. F. building, in which the Heilig theater is located. "It will be changed continually, and always be made to look different," says Mr. Holt. The electric lights at present arranged in front of the I. O. O. F. building will be somewhat changed.

ed." Holt states, the change also being made this week. The sidewalk in front of the theater, for years only dimly lighted, will be furnished with an ample supply of brilliant light, he declares.

DAVIS SWORN IN AS SECRETARY OF WAR

Washington, Oct. 14.—(A. P.)—Dwight F. Davis of Missouri was sworn in today as secretary of war. Chief Justice William Howard Taft, a former secretary of war, administered the oath, and John W. Weeks, retiring secretary of war, stood by. The chief of staff of the army, Major General John L. Hines, his assistants and chiefs of war department bureaus, witnessed the ceremony.

Mr. Weeks remained in Washington overnight, delaying his return to Boston in order to witness the induction of his successor into office. Mr. and Mrs. Weeks will leave for Massachusetts tonight.

8 VILLAGES HAVE NO BABIES IN 30 YEARS

Tokyo, Japan.—The population of the Ryukyu islands, which lie between Japan and Formosa, is rapidly dying off, declared S. Sakurai, a health officer of the Okinawa prefecture, who attended the recent health conference in Tokyo. Malaria is blamed principally for the decrease. In eight villages of the Yacama group, it was said, not a single baby has been born for the last 30 years. In Nozoko village, Mr. Sakurai said, one sick old woman was the only inhabitant.

POLISH ISSUE RETARDS PACT

Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 14.—(A. P.)—That the Polish problem, particularly the question of the Polish corridor to the sea, still troubles the Locarno security conference, was the impression given today by Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, who said that he and Sir Cecil Hurst, English jurist, had placed their services at the disposal of the delegates in an endeavor to reach an agreement concerning Germany's eastern frontiers.

It is understood that difficulties have arisen over the text of the Polish-German arbitration treaty because Poland, wishing to protect her corridor to the sea, does not desire that the treaty shall effect disputes arising out of existing treaties, which she believes can only be revised under the provisions of the league of nations covenant.

Moreover Poland wants the same guarantee from her ally, France, for the Polish-German treaty as Great Britain is according to France and Germany in connection with the Rhine security pact.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—Charlie Chaplin has no ambition to play Hamlet. "I'm too much of a Hamlet in real life," he said when questioned concerning recurring rumors of his desire to play high tragedy.

The peak of his ambition is to make people laugh, said the film comedian, who stopped in Chicago between trains on his way to Hollywood from New York.
