Providence, R. I.—Mrs. Jesse Margaret Bullong, who threw away of her husband's with sheets out of the window of his New York apartment with notes written on them, has won the litigation with him. He has been denied an injunction to prevent her from trespassing upon his New York estate.

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The land transferred lies in township 9, range 7 west, in what is known as the Bald mountain country on the Big Luckiamuts watershed in the southwestern part of Polk county. It contains 88,115,000 feet of timber according to Fred J. Holman, county assessor, and was assessed on the rolls at \$44,410.

The land includes parts of sections 4 and 6 and of sections 8 and 10 in township 9 south, range 7 west and is in the immediate cutting area now being logged by Spaulding over the Valley & Siletz line. The deal has been under negotiation for some time and is thought to have been practically closed for over a year as Spaulding has acted as agent for Weyerhaeuser and cared for the taxes upon it in 1924 and 1925.

The same disposal of approximately one-third of the Weyerhaeuser holdings in Polk county and leaves the balance well consolidated. It lies in township 7 south, range 3 west and is in the northwestern part of Polk county adjoining the Willamette Valley Lumber company holdings, which are being taken out over the Black Rock line and the Miami Corporation holdings which will be milled at New Grand Ronde. It is probable that this top will be sold within due course of time to one or the other of the concerns operating adjacent to it. Weyerhaeuser owns approximately one-fourth of township 7 S.

The Spaulding timber is milled in the company's plants at Salem and Newberg.
