

\$1,000,000 BOND ISSUE PLACED BY SPAULDING CO.

Dallas, Oct. 15.—The largest mortgage ever placed on record in Polk county was filed for recording Wednesday with County Clerk H. G. Black. It is a trust mortgage from the Charles K. Spaulding Logging company to the Detroit Trust company of Detroit, Mich., to cover the issuance of \$1,000,000 ten-year gold bonds bearing 6 per cent interest.

It involves all of the extensive Spaulding timber holdings in Polk county, the mills of the company in Salem and Newberg and some timber holdings in Benton county. It is a duplicate copy but bears evidence of \$500 in internal revenue stamps which are affixed to the original.

Satisfies Old Mortgage.
The mortgage satisfies a similar one for \$500,000 issued May 1, 1919. The mortgage stipulates that the funds derived are for the purpose of refunding existing debts, paying existing and future carrying charges on other lands, and for operating and other proper corporate purposes. The bonds are to be issued under date of October 1, 1925 and run to October 1, 1935, with provision made for retirement in blocks of \$25,000 or more at the option of Spaulding company.

The trust mortgage states that \$150,000 of the issue shall not be certified now but held by the company until it shall desire to sell the bonds and use the proceeds for the purchase of additional timber.

Covers 60 Sections.
The mortgage covers parts of 60 sections of timber land owned by Spaulding in Polk county. This lies on the Rickreall watershed and the Big Lucklunnae district largely. Parts of six sections of Benton county land are included and all of the operating equipment, logging railroads and other property of the company.

The Spaulding holdings in Polk county include 27,713 acres, partly cut-over land, according to Fred Holman, county assessor. This was prior to the Weyerhaeuser purchase of 1922, the deed for which was recorded Wednesday. This was included in the mortgage.

The trust mortgage covers about 60 full typewritten pages and the recording fee amounted to \$48. It will be necessary to record it in Polk, Marion, Yamhill and Benton counties.

The trust mortgage for \$500,000 executed in 1919 was similar to the present one but did not include as much property. Under its terms, if fully carried out, \$200,000 would have been retired by May 1, 1925. The amount outstanding on it was not disclosed.

Preparation of abstracts covering the Polk county land was carried out by Sibley & Dakin of Dallas in August and September. It is not known locally whether there is any large development move back of the bond issue or not. It undoubtedly will mean continued activity of present mills, however, as the \$350,000 bonds to be issued at once require \$51,000 per year in interest, in addition to the large tax drain and other holding expenses.

DOLLAR CLUB TO BUY TEAM FOR JOHNSON

Muskogee, Okla., Oct. 15.—(AP)—A movement to raise a fund among baseball fans of America for the purchase of a baseball club for Walter Johnson, the "big train" of the Washington Senators, has been launched here.

The plan originated with Claude Willford, president of the Eastern Oklahoma play grounds association, and local business man.

"A million fans give a million dollars for a baseball team for Walter," is the slogan of Willford's campaign. In less than an hour last night fifty five local men and women gave \$1 each to the fund.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 15.—Hardly had a dispatch from Muskogee, Okla., announced the initiation of a drive for "a million dollars from a million fans" to buy a baseball club for Walter Johnson, than a "net of news hounds" here made claim to being the "first to follow."

Eight minutes after word of the fund had been received, six fans had contributed the "first rata" and the club had started.

LOSES LIFE IN FIGHTING INSECTS

London, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The death of Professor Harold Maxwell Lefroy in his battle of science against insect pests has robbed hygiene of one of its foremost champions. Death was due to a poison gas with which he had been experimenting at the laboratory of the Imperial college of science and technology at South Kensington.

His life had been devoted to combating man's insect enemies and his efforts had been rewarded with some remarkable success, notably in destroying pests which attack cotton, silk, wheat and wood and also in educating the public against the danger of the house fly. His services in combating the fly pest during the world war received wide recognition.

RECEIVER NAMED FOR OREGON NURSERY COMPANY

Hillsboro, Or., Oct. 15.—W. J. Hald of Portland was appointed by Circuit Judge Bagley today to act as receiver for the Oregon Nursery company of Oreno.

The appointment arose from a suit filed here October 5 by the Portland Trust & Savings bank against the nursery company to foreclose on approximately \$225,000 worth of the nursery's mortgage bonds which are past due. The suit also asked that a receiver be appointed to take charge of all the assets of the company and conduct its business.

RALSTON DEAD AFTER ILLNESS OF SIX WEEKS

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Samuel Ralston, 67, junior United States senator from Indiana, and venerated patriarch of Indiana democracy, died at his estate, Hooper Home, near here last night, after an illness of six weeks.

Death came to the senator after 23 hours of unconsciousness climaxing an attack of cerebral poisoning which has confined him to his bed since September 5 and which had impaired his health since early this year.

Members of his family and more than a score of intimate friends were gathered at the home to receive the news, shortly after 11 o'clock last night that death had come. Senator Ralston had known for some weeks of his condition and had bade his family and friends farewell before lapsing into the coma which preceded his death in his early youth Ralston turned and taught school before turning to the study of law, which opened a political career for him.

Surviving him are the widow, a daughter and two sons, a brother, a sister and a nephew of Indianapolis.

Funeral arrangements are expected by friends of the family to provide for interment at Lebanon, Ind., the senator's old home, from which he was elected to the governorship.

NEW CITY HALL FOR SILVERTON

Silverton, Oct. 15.—(Special)—The city council of Silverton met in special session Monday night. The new city hall, which was formally opened Wednesday evening, was inspected and the council passed an estimate number six of the hall. A few minor things still remain to pass upon but Monday night's passing was considered the final one.

Other business to come before the council was a petition for a boxing commission which was presented and granted. The library board appeared and asked for \$300 which was granted the board. The city engineer was instructed to get rubber matting for the new hall and the city recorder was allowed the price of a new typewriter.

FREE PLANE FROM DIRIGIBLE

Pulham, England, Oct. 15.—(AP)—An experiment in releasing an airplane from an airship while in flight was successfully carried out this morning when the dirigible R-33 took the air with the DH-53 monoplane suspended from a trap-peg beneath the hull.

Piloted by Lieutenant R. Lehaga Haig, chief test pilot, the monoplane was released at an altitude of about 3000 feet and made a successful flight.

After cruising about for half an hour, Lieutenant Haig attached his plane again to the dirigible. He was once more released and resumed his solo flight while the R-33 continued her cruise and later returned to her mooring mast.

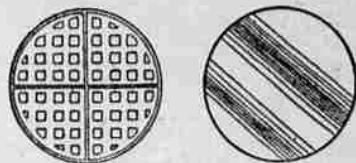

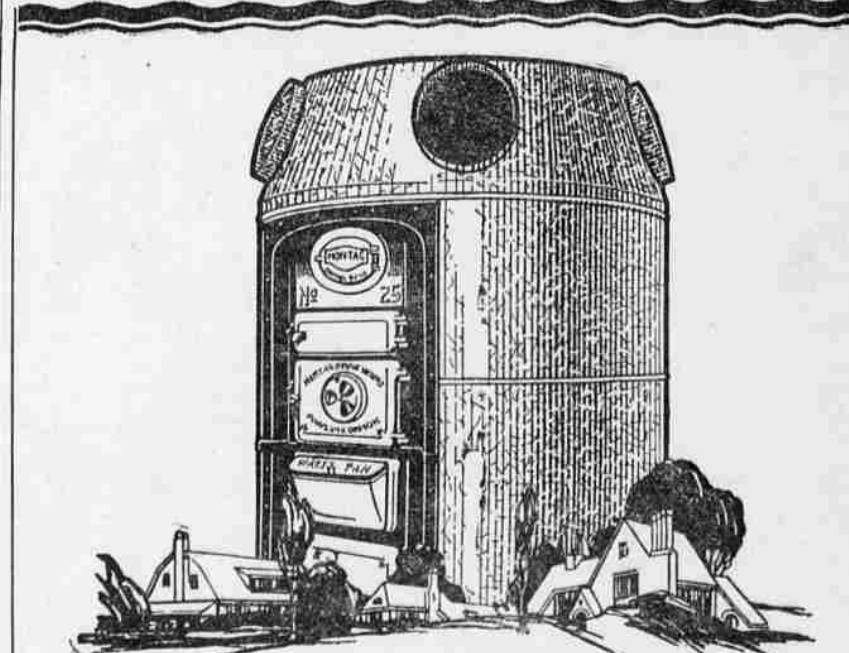
