point was stressed that the league is purely non-partisan. Mrs. Carver said that the national league believes that the American public life suffers from the indifference of public opinion to the government.

Mrs. Scholz proved to be one of the most inspiring speakers ever heard in Salem. The subject of "General Education" was handled in a broad and fearless manner. "Education is a subject that every one must contemplate as a possible panacea for the world's ills," said Mrs. Scholz in her introduction. Again, "Education always denotes an attempt on the part of the adult members of human society to shape the development of the coming generation in accordance with its own ideals of life." The tendency to condemn as "dangerous" any new theories on religious, social, economic and political questions by the same people who insist on having the newest in automobiles, clothes, doctors, lawyers and haircuts was decried by Mrs. Scholz. An educated man or woman was described by the speaker as one who can face the world and any problem the world may offer with understanding and wisdom. Another definition of education was "everything which helps to shape the human being."
