## OLD GRADS TRIM BEARCATS HERE

With a superior backfield, the Willamette alumni football team defeated the varsity 20 to 13 on Sweetland field Saturday afternoon.

"I think there is some good material in the varsity string this year," said Waldo Zeller, alumnus, at the close of the game. "We just had them bluffed. It always used to be that way when I was playing on the team." Zeller acted as captain of the alumni aggregation.

Despite the fact that the alumni had had no team practice previous to the game, it showed an superiority in forward passing over the varsity eleven. The most sensational advances by the air route were made in the third frame. Passing the ball some 35 yards, Isham, quarterback, dropped into the waiting arms of Gillette, who was playing left end.
