One hundred and twenty-five relatives and friends from Salem, Portland and Eugene, and points in Washington and California, were present for the occasion which united the scions of two prominent valley families. The living rooms, library and veranda of the attractive home were the scene of the wedding. The bride wore a beautiful gown of shimmering white chiffon with a full length veil of the palest pink fastened with a coroner of rose point lace which has been in the family for a number of years. A tiny cluster of orange blossoms was fastened to each side. The wedding gown itself was a dream of beauty. It was made simply with a double circular skirt. 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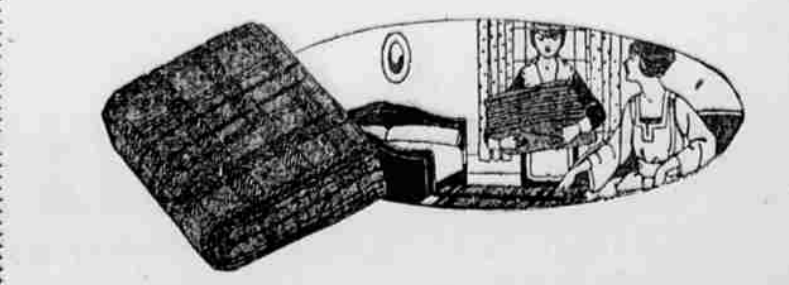
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
