Constitutionality of the law permitting affidavits of prejudice to be filed against judges and compelling the judges in such cases to relinquish the bench to another jurist, is attacked in the case of W. S. U'Ren against Judge George J. Bagley of Washington county. The case grows out of a divorce proceeding of Byron Cliff Ford Salton against Ethel Gertrude Salton in which U'Ren submitted an affidavit of prejudice against Bagley. The latter as judge of the court refused to recognize it and U'Ren filed original proceedings in mandamus in the state supreme court, an alternative writ being issued by Chief Justice McBride on October 3. Bagley today filed a demurrer to the writ.

Oppose Tax Cut Of \$250,000 For Income Tax Payers

Treasury officials, that a surplus of \$290,000,000 is in prospect this year in federal revenues, was submitted to the house ways and means committee at the opening of its hearings on tax reform.

The treasury secretary also renewed his advocacy of a constitutional amendment abolishing tax exempt securities. He observed, however, that the amount of outstanding tax exempt securities now is so large—he estimated that the government should attempt taking away the "artificial" advantage held by these securities. Enactment of the proposed 20 per cent surtax will do the work, the secretary added.

The gift tax was characterized by the secretary as one of a "great many artificial restraints and inequalities now in the taxing law." He declared "the excuse for the gift tax would entirely disappear" if the 20 per cent maximum on incomes is adopted.

DEFENDANT TALKS JURY OUT OF IT FOUR TIMES

Cleveland, Ohio.—Joseph Kirby, who has faced four juries on charges growing out of the collapse of the Cleveland Discount company, which he organized virtually single-handed, will go to trial here again on a federal indictment charging use of the mails to defraud.

Twice juries that sat in judgment on Kirby disagreed and twice he was acquitted. In each case it was said that the defendant "sold himself" to the juries, in being freely admitted that the same personal magnetism and "super-salesmanship" which lifted Kirby from a penniless stranger in Cleveland to the head of the \$40,000,000 concern, helped to convince the jurors that he was innocent of the charges made against him.

LONDON PEDESTRIANS WAR AGAINST DRIVERS

London, Eng.—In consequence of the increasing number of road traffic casualties, which have almost tripled in the past seven years, a "Pedestrian Protection Society" has been formed with the object of insuring its members against street accidents and to provide legal advice for them.

At one point in the speech he took his coat half way off, putting it back on again. One of his favorite gestures was to hold his hands in his mouth in the shape of a magnifying glass.

There were some 1500 persons turned away from the church, which was filled to capacity by 9 a. m., an hour and a quarter before Sunday appeared to speak.

Governor Pierce presided, sitting on the platform throughout the address, nodding approval upon occasion and applauding with the rest when they applauded.
