

HEAR ADVICE ON REDUCTION OF INCOME TAXES

Washington, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—With the administration's tax reduction proposal as a starting point, the house ways and means committee today listened to advice of various organizations of citizens on many disputed features of the tax legislation that is to be presented at the next session of congress.

The National Association of Manufacturers, the Retailers National Council, the Texas Tax club, the New York Board of Trade and the Real Estate Board of New York, all were allowed time to present their views at today's committee session. Passing over for the moment Secretary Mellon's suggestion for a reduction of income taxes all along the line, the committeemen first heard representatives of the Texas tax clubs endorse the secretary's proposal for repeal of the federal inheritance or estate tax. Speaking for a delegation of 18, Lee Satterwhite of Amarillo, speaker of the Texas house, said the state of Texas felt it should have sole jurisdiction over inheritance taxes within its borders. Texas not only needs that source of revenue, he said, but the present federal inheritance tax levied is proving almost confiscatory.

SPECULATORS BULL STOCKS

New York, Oct. 21.—Speculators for the advance regained control of the price movements in today's stock market by bidding up successfully the rail, motor, oil and equipment shares. There was a marked cessation of the bear selling pressure which had characterized the wild market of the previous three days, and trading was again back on a normal basis. Publication of the Locarno agreements and the granting of American credit to Belgium helped to restore speculative confidence. General Electric scored an extreme advance of eight points and Mack Truck, American Can, Western Union, United Cigar Stores, International Harvester and Yellow Cab were pushed up four to five points.

The closing was strong. Trading was enlivened by a spurt of 3 1/2 points in General Railway Signal to a new peak price at 37 1/2 and a jump of 10 points in Jersey Central, while American Can soared to a record high at 25 1/2. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

UMPQUA JETTY TO BE EXTENDED BY U. S.

Washington, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—The engineering corps of the United States army has decided to extend the jetty the mouth of the Umpqua river in Oregon so that the flow of water in that stream will scour away the sand bar impeding navigation at that point. An allotment of \$64,000 for this project was authorized today from existing river and harbor improvement funds.

PRINCESS NOW SALESGIRL, WEDS

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Many former subjects of the emperor of Russia came to Seattle today for the marriage here tonight of Princess Marina Golitsin to Boris Kukserhoff, University of Washington sophomore, former imperial army officer and the princess' childhood playmate. The ceremony was to be conducted by Rev. Father Nicholas Metropolsky with all the old ritual of the Russian orthodox faith.

Many coming for the wedding were men who, in Seattle and adjoining cities, are known to fellow workmen as Nick or Pete, but who, in the day of the czar, were among the highest officials, professional and military men of the old regime. Although the bride and bridegroom have been in America less than three years both speak English perfectly. For two years the princess has been a sales girl in a downtown department store here.
