

ESPEE PLANS TO ADVERTISE ALL PACIFIC COAST

"Persistent world advertising, and more of it, for the Pacific coast and the southwest will be obtained by the Southern Pacific company in 1926," T. M. Schumacher, vice president in charge of traffic for the company, stated today on adjournment of a conference of 25 of the company's traffic representatives to outline the railroads 1926 advertising program.

Officials of the company from all parts of the United States, including those in charge of Southern Pacific foreign agencies were present the meeting in working out the advertising program, the main purpose was to bring more tourists, settlers and industries to the west.

"The Pacific coast is developing at a faster pace than any other section of the country," Schumacher said. "Reports of our representatives in Europe and in every large center in the United States show that the Pacific coast and its progress is attracting world wide interest. The financial investment which the company will make in its 1926 advertising program will direct this attention to the home, agricultural and industrial opportunities as well as tourist attractions along our lines."

"Tourists become residents and residents become producers the best opportunities for the individual are found in the west."

"Through this extensive advertising we hope to induce many thousands of people from the east and other countries to come out here and see for themselves, the advantages and attractions to be found in this as yet undeveloped western empire."

WAGES HIGHEST IN U. S. OF ANY OF 18 COUNTRIES

Washington, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Wages, as measured both by their amount and what they will purchase, are higher in the United States than in any of 18 other countries covered in a monthly index compiled by the International Labor office.

The index, based on wages for various lines of skilled and unskilled labor and on food and rent costs in a principal city for each of the countries on July 1, places the figure for Philadelphia at 183. The next highest in the list was Ottawa, Canada, with 165, while the lowest 42, was reported for Lisbon, London, with 100, was used as the index base.

FARM ON LUCKIAMUTE PURCHASED BY SALEMITE

Dallas, Oct. 22.—The sale of an 80-acre improved farm on the Luckiamute a few miles from the Helmick bridge was announced this week by Butler, Craven & Shaw, local real estate dealers. The farm was the property of Joe Card and was purchased by W. F. Good of Salem.

Sales of farms have been of rare occurrence during recent months, although many trades have been negotiated.

MONMOUTH TO PLAN FLAX PLANT

Monmouth, Oct. 22.—(Special)—At the regular meeting of the Monmouth Commercial club held in the Monmouth hotel Tuesday night the flax industry was the chief subject of discussion. State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay, being the speaker of the evening on this subject. Mr. Kay went into detail regarding the growing and manufacturing of flax products giving a very clear conception of the industry as applicable to the Willamette valley, where experts have proved that a superior product is now grown.

The Monmouth Commercial club appointed a committee to inspect the process plant at Turner with the view of establishing one at Monmouth. Considerable acreage is now grown in this vicinity and it is expected that the increase will be rapid. Those present, about fifty in number, were convinced of the desirability of encouraging this new industry and a strong effort will be made by the club to promote it around Monmouth.

Deposits in the First National bank of Monmouth as of October 15 are approximately 10 per cent higher than at the same date last year. Four new business enterprises have located here during the year. Business conditions are generally reported better in this section.

HAWK PLUCKS OUT EYE OF MAIL CARRIER
