In relating the story of his two previous escapes from the prison Kelley said that on the second occasion, after he had escaped in a load of sawdust hauled out of the yard to the state fairgrounds, he had returned voluntarily. Asked why, he replied:

"I got away in the morning and was out all day. Along about 9 o'clock that night I got to thinking of Mr. Smith. I thought Smith was warden at that time. He had been trying to do right by the boys, and I got ashamed of myself and returned."

Thought Hinton Insane
 Kelley testified that it was the general opinion among the convicts that Guard Hinton, alleged to have fired shots into the bull pen, was insane, and that he talked to himself almost incessantly while on the walls. Guard Davidson, was known among the prisoners to have killed five or six convicts here and in other prisons. Kelley said that he had been in the prison yards on two occasions when Davidson shot at convicts without cause. One of these shots, he declared, went just over the head of Bert Oregon Jones, convict killed in the break of August 12.

J. V. Starratt, former parole officer at the prison, was called by the defense to testify as to the effects of attempting to aid Jones in his escape in Josephine county. Starratt testified that he had been led to believe that he would be shown leniency, but that he was given the maximum sentence. Asked what effect these incidents had had upon him, Kelley replied: "They had a very depressing effect."

Dr. Hammond. "If they have the board will give us an increased annual appropriation, despite their custom, then the money at Seattle will have that much to do on."

Dr. Hammond denies flatly that there is any thought of changing the nature of the school in any way, as indicated in some newspaper.

It is assumed that in case the board of education favors upon the proposition of Kimball becoming connected with a state university, efforts will be redoubled to bring the school to Tacoma, where the College of Puget Sound, a Methodist institution, is located. Persons connected with Kimball, however, while reticent about committing themselves, are under the impression that the school would be no better off by moving to Tacoma. Due to the fact that more thorough and frequent campaigns for money have been staged by the college at Puget Sound than by Willamette, there would probably be less support for Kimball there than here. Furthermore, the College of Puget Sound is a younger and smaller college than Willamette, although growing more rapidly, and Tacoma is not enough larger than Salem to warrant the move. Kimball college authorities are believed to have the desire to move to a large city if possible. At Portland, the only other large city to which the school could be moved, there is no college with which it could become connected.

At yesterday's conference a motion was made, as reported in the papers, to ask Kimball to move to Seattle. Later, however, the motion was withdrawn, the fact not being reported in the papers. After considerable discussion a motion was passed recommending that Kimball be moved to some point in the Puget Sound district, if found
