

REINERT SENT BACK TO SCHOOL

Dallas, Oct. 23.—At a preliminary hearing in justice court here today Raymond Reinert, a former school boy, who had been depended upon by the prosecution to implicate Ted Macomber in the robbery of the E. E. Glover home several weeks ago, failed to hold to the story which authorities declare he told out of court. The boy's former story, authorities say, was to the effect that he and Macomber together robbed the Glover home. The youth etekins, to his story in the face of stiff cross questioning, Macomber was turned loose by Judge E. F. Good.

Reinert had been paroled from the reform school to the Glovers, who live west of Dallas. The robbery, which took place when the Glovers were away, amounted to a small quantity of household goods. It was said that Macomber had been on the premises for some time prior to the robbery, chumming about with Reinert.

Reinert and Macomber had spent last night in jail together. Reinert has been returned to the state boys' training school at Salem.

FRENCH FAI TO AGREE ON PLAN

Paris, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The French cabinet meeting today broke up without Finance Minister Caillaux full detailing his fiscal measure or submitting his resignation which had been anticipated in some quarters. The cabinet is to meet again on Monday.

While not giving the details of his plans, M. Caillaux laid his financial position of the country before his colleagues in general terms. The impression prevails that the cabinet will meet the chamber of deputies next Thursday without any change in its membership, although full agreement on the financial question has not yet been reached among the ministers.

FIRST HEN'S EGG LAID AT SPITZENBERG HARBOR

Barentsburg, Green Harbor, Spitzbergen, Oct. 23.—(A. P.)—Spitzbergen is paying due honor to its first locally laid hen's egg. Eggs, as eggs, are not scarce here, for those of the Elder duck and tern may be picked up by thousands in the summer time. But the product of the ordinary barnyard fowl heretofore has been unknown.

The egg was laid in the hennery

of Director Dresselbuy of the Dutch Coal company, who is making an attempt to acclimatize chickens. His hennery owing to the bitterness of the weather, is heated. It has to be darkened during a part of each 24 hours of the mid-sun period. In the Arctic winter artificial sunlight has to be provided. Thus the hens are being made to feel at home under the 73th degree, northern latitude.

LOOKS TO STATE FOR SETTLERS

Washington, Oct. 23.—(A. P.)—The problem of obtaining settlers for government reclamation projects was declared by Secretary Work in reviewing his department for 1925, to be the most difficult of all reclamation problems. He pointed out that the consensus is that construction of new work should be deferred until this question is solved.

"The essential part of the federal reclamation policy of the fu-

ture," said Mr. Work, "is a program of land settlement and farm development. Unless settlers can be attracted to the projects and are able to remain on them, there is no reason for building them, and the government will not be reimbursed for their costs. The government constructs irrigation projects, but it cannot draft settlers."

"One solution of the settlement problem is co-operation between the federal government and the states in which the projects are located, the states to assume the responsibility of settlement."

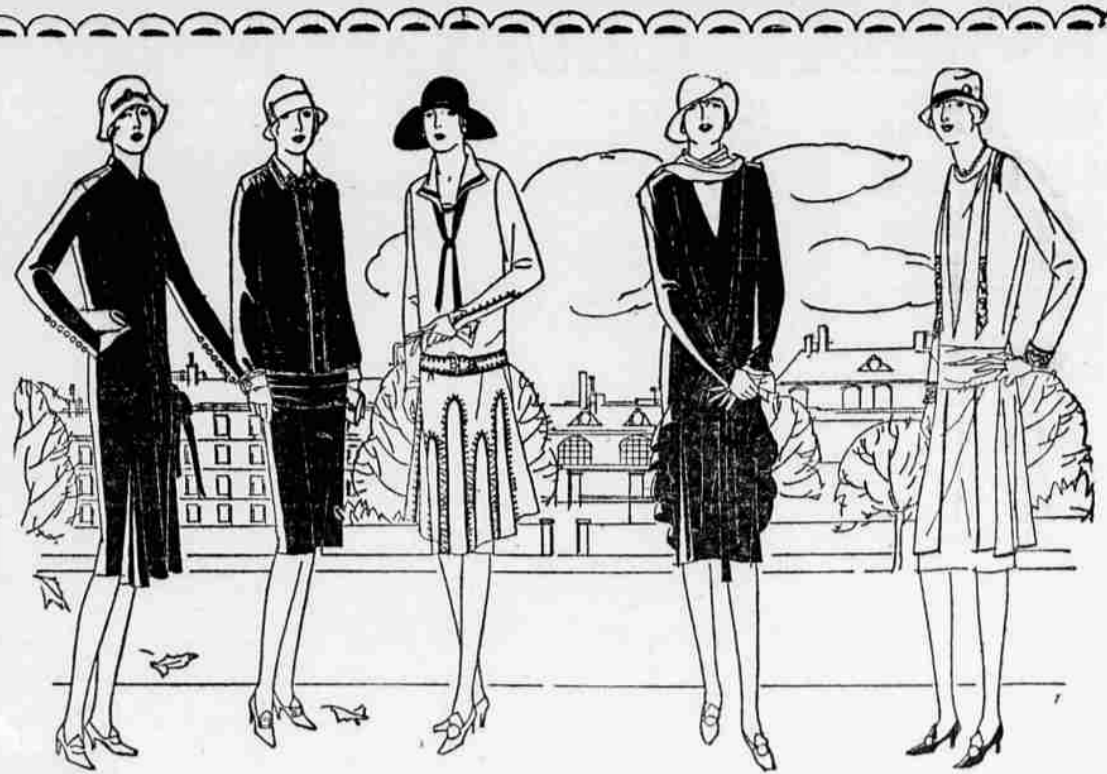
