

PRUNE CROP IN HANDS OF GROWERS CLEANED-UP

TENDENCY TO FIRMNESS SEEN IN LOCAL PRUNES

With the Oregon prune crop in the hands of growers virtually cleaned up, probably not more than a million pounds of the 20,000,000 pound crop remaining in their hands, a slight firming tendency is indicated.

This may be a reaction following a firming tendency on California, California 30s showing up lighter than expected with a result that they have gone back up to within a half a cent of the opening price, when they had once dropped a full cent below the opening price. California 40s are now a cent under the opening, 50s 1/2 of a cent under, 60s half a cent under and 70s and smaller have gone back to the opening prices where they are being firmly maintained.

Oregon is long on 30s this year which may have been partially the reason for California taking their lead, but the estimate on California 30s earlier in the season was said to have been much larger than the crop actually developed, which also had its effect on the early weakening of the market on them.

The Robert C. Paulus company is packing out and shipping a considerable quantity of extra fancy pack under their new Lakeview brand. The pack is being put up in standard boxes, Paulus stating that quite a heavy demand has developed for this extra fancy pack and there are prospects for a good trade in it.

EGGS ADVANCE 2 CENTS MORE FOR TOP GRADES

Portland, Oct. 22—(AP)—Egg prices are sharply higher in the local market today with bids on the exchange advancing one to three cents. Shortage of fresh stocks locally along with the general upward trend in other food markets is responsible for the sharp advance here.

Top grades are showing the most strength with fresh standard extras 2 cents higher for the day at 57 cents and fresh standard firsts three cents higher at 53 cents. Under-sized and current receipt eggs each advanced a cent.

Buyers are offering 47 to 48 cents for current receipt stocks delivered Portland, with bids for fresh standard extras ranging as high as 51 cents.

Prices are now approaching a prohibitive level with the consumer already paying from 59 to 62 cents for his eggs at the store. It also means that stores, which are unable to sell their eggs, will be forced to reduce the price of fresh eggs as the price of fresh eggs goes higher.

WOOL STEADY MOHAIR STRONG

Boston, Mass., Oct. 22—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Activity in the American markets has been fair this week and prices are very steady with an upward tendency. The foreign markets generally have appreciated another five per cent. Australia being very buoyant, with the added competition from Yorkshire."

"The manufacturing situation seems slowly to be clearing and adjustments between the raw material and the finished goods are gradually being made. Owing to the various stages of manufacture into normal relative position, a process, however, which is taking time."

"Offerings of Texas fall wools have been postponed to about the tenth of November."

"Mohair is strong with some inquiry on lower combing qualities at around 60 cents."

STRAIGHTENING OUT AFFAIRS OF WOLF ESTATE

Complicated affairs of the estate of the late Adolph Wolf, for many years prominent hopman and assistant of Silverton, seem to be near a complete ironing out under the direction of M. G. Gunderson, named administrator after the estate had been partially administered and November 24, this year, is the time set for final hearing in probate on the matter when it is believed the affairs of the estate will be completely cleaned up.

One feature of the straightening out of the affairs is the organization of the estate, organized for the sole purpose of buying the assets of the bankrupt estate and taking them over so conflicting differences can be ironed out.

The report of Gunderson shows the following claims have been allowed in connection with the estate: First National bank, Portland, \$2800; Coolidge & McClaine, \$12,540; First National and Peoples' bank of Silverton, consolidated, \$5150; Carl Ullman Co., \$16,114.77; Roy Morley, \$4823; Robert Cole, two claims, one for \$3383.15 and the other for \$4036.64. Receipts are shown by the administrator to have been \$20,503.01 and disbursements \$18,100.74. Disbursements for the Jewel ranch were \$12,574.44 and for the Smith yard, \$5,584.

Under the report arrangements have been made for Otto J. Kraemer to take over the Silver Creek farm two miles west of Silverton to satisfy indebtedness.

Administration of the estate is carried on under two estates, personal and partnership estates.
