

COMMUNISTS SEEK TO ENLIST NEGROES AS REDS

Washington, Oct. 24.—(A. P.)—Communists agitators are seeking to bring the American negro into the revolutionary fold.

The American negro labor congress which is meeting in Chicago tomorrow is shown in the descriptive literature, of which official note has been taken in Washington, to have been organized chiefly by communists, with backing from Russia, for the purpose of "awakening to revolutionary significance" the negroes of America.

Negro trade unionists whose participation in the congress has been solicited have been warned by the American Federation of Labor, through its president, William Green, to refrain from any connection with it.

In a statement denouncing the whole purpose of the congress, which is in the manifesto proclaiming the purpose also of redressing the wrongs of the social grievances of American negroes, Mr. Green declares: "It will not be held to benefit the negro but to still into the lives of that race the most pernicious doctrine—race hatred."

A number of trades union have been "deceived into sending delegates," Mr. Green states, in warning: "all negro members of trade unions that they are being led into a trap that will eventually be their undoing."

DUKE'S MILLIONS LEFT TO COLLEGE

New York, Oct. 24.—(A. P.)—A bequest of \$10,000,000 to be administered by the Duke endowment was made in the will of the late James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, in his will filed for probate today at Somerville, N. J.

The will directed that \$4,000,000 of the \$10,000,000 bequest should be for the construction and equipment of a medical school, hospital and nurses' home at Duke university at Durham, N. C. The will does not reveal the total value of the Duke estate, which has been variously estimated at sums as high as \$150,000,000.

The will gave Mrs. Nanaline H. Duke for life the Duke Fifth avenue property, "Rough Point" at Newport, R. I., and "Lynnewood," at Myers Park, N. C. Mrs. Nanaline H. Duke is a second wife married in 1907.

SALMON EGGS ARE SHIPPED

Mill City, Or., Oct. 24.—The third shipment of salmon eggs to move from the racks near Breitenbush went forward Wednesday, approximately two and one-half million eggs going to the hatchery at Mehama. Leroy Ledgerwood, manager of the hatchery was in charge. This makes a total of about six million eggs that have been taken to date, and it is expected that about four or five million more will be gathered.
