

MRS. FREY WINS \$37,500 AWARD AS HEART BALM

Mineola, N. Y., Oct. 26.—(A. P.)—Mrs. Katherine Frey, of Louisville, Ky., today was awarded a jury verdict for \$37,500 against Wilda Bennett, musical comedy actress, for alienating the affections of the plaintiff's husband, Charles C. Frey, race horse owner and sportsman.

The case was given to the jury in supreme court last Friday afternoon and a sealed verdict was returned late Friday night. The verdict was read when court convened this morning. The case was being tried before Supreme Justice Faber.

Mrs. Frey sued for \$100,000. The trial lasted almost a week. Miss Bennett and Frey sat in the court room and Mrs. Frey, on the witness stand, accused the actress of stealing the affections of her husband.

TOUCH OF CHRIST HEALTHFUL SAYS EVANS IN SERMON

Speaking on the subject "The Touch of Christ," Rev. J. J. Evans of the First Christian church of Salem yesterday evening declared: "A scouter has been quoted as saying, 'If I were God, I would make health catching instead of disease.'"

"Is it not true," asked Rev. Mr. Evans, "that health is catching? Character of the right sort is wonderfully stimulating for good. This is the impression that we get of Jesus. His touch always brought good, happiness, outlook." Rev. Mr. Evans spoke from the text, "As many as touched Him were made whole."

"He was not called 'healer,' but 'savior,'" he said. "Healing was incidental to His great program of redemption. His physical touch of superficial to the great purpose of spiritual good."

"There is wonderful significance in the desire of people to crowd about Him, to touch Him. It indicates his nearness to humanity. He could be approached by the common people. His goodness could be imparted by contact, not by becoming a recluse. He dined with sinners because they needed His touch on ideal and graciousness."

"His touch was always for the betterment of men. He was not a disease carrier. Spiritual health

health He gave in abundant measure. Some people give out evil along their way, they are destructive only. One may argue against His deity, but never against the good He did, the health He gave to mind and soul. Infidelity will never be able to overcome His masterly touch upon life.

"He seemed to realize that character is the most potent thing in the world. We will not be saved by institutions, governments, social welfare, etc., but by the impact of life upon life, character upon character. Mercy, love faith greater to Him than mint, anise and cummin. His gracious touch is making the world better every day."

MODERN YOUTH AND PRACTICES SCRUTINIZED

Washington, Oct. 26.—Modern American youth was scrutinized—and his ways were deplored—yesterday at various group meetings forming part of the forty-second international convention of the Young Men's Christian association.

Among the character destroying influences which delegates said were besetting youth were listed:

The family automobile; too "fiddle wooden discipline; American advertising which creates desire for thing not needed; purchasing on the installment plan; lack of proper sex education; anabolic magazines; gambling, dancing, drinking and drugs; too much spare time; lack of religious teaching in the home; few family meals together and the propensity of parents to travel without their children.

A few delegates, however, asserted that some of the older folks had "bad memories" when it came to their own youth, and William D. Murray of Plainfield, N. J., went so far as to say, "I believe in the younger generation."

"The fact is," he recalled, "that the young fellows of your day and of mine had petting parties just the same as they do today, only they were more under cover and we didn't say so much about it."

UMPUQUA MAN IS SUICIDE

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 26.—Thomas Chipman, 70-year-old resident of North Myrtle Creek, killed himself late Friday night, in the opinion of officers, by shooting himself through the head with a shotgun. The shotgun and a forked stick which had been used to push the trigger lay on the ground.

Despondency over continued ill health was believed by neighbors to be the motive for the suicide.

ORDER SALE OF MEDFORD COAST RAILROAD LINE

The public service commission today issued an order for disposal of the Medford Coast railroad owned by W. S. Barnum, holding that Mr. Barnum must offer the railroad for sale at a price not to exceed the dismantled value. If a buyer does not appear on or before November 10 then Mr. Barnum will have the privilege of dismantling the road. Recent attempt by Barnum to dismantle the road were stopped by injunction.

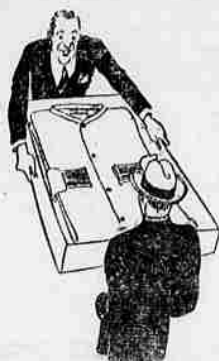
"The record shows," says the order, "that by extending the line

into the mountainous section a distance of 18 or 20 miles a large tract of merchantable timber some thing in excess of 2,000,000,000 feet would be made available for manufacture—that some few farms and a very promising mining venture would be served.

"This is, therefore, a matter of public interest, and it is highly important that enterprising citizens of Medford and Jacksonville should take such action as may be necessary to secure the very desirable manufacturing industry of lumber for which there will be an enormous demand in the very near future."

"Mr. Barnum has stated in the record in this case that he is willing to sell the road for \$12,000 to the citizens of Medford and Jacksonville and that this sum is less than the scrap value of the road."
