Covers were laid for eighty club women with Mrs. Dunbar occupying the place of honor. Mrs. Wm. Fordyce Fargo, president of the Salem Woman's club, presided.

Mrs. Dunbar opened her address by explaining the work of the departments of the state federation and the results accomplished by each department. The later part of her talk covered the subject of "what club women stand for."

Salem parent teacher associations will be well represented at the 20th annual convention of the Oregon parent teacher association which will be held in the First Methodist Episcopal church in Portland on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

In addition to the elected delegates a number of the association members are planning to attend one or more of the sessions. The Liberty association will be represented by Mrs. Claude Stevens, Mrs. Bruce Cunningham and Mrs. Russell Wright. Mrs. A. M. Chapman is the official delegate from the Salem Heights council. The convention promises to be the largest parent teacher convention yet held in Oregon, with a greater proportion of teachers present than in former years, according to convention officials. The action of the Portland school board in permitting the attendance without loss of salary of one teacher each day from each school having a parent teacher association has set an excellent example for other school boards thru out the state, local parent teacher association workers believe.

The books of the treasurer and corresponding secretary show a total paid membership of 15,893 thru out the state. The total number of accredited delegates is 717. There are 221 associations in state membership, a gain of 45 during the year. Since this tabulation notice has been received of a number of new associations that have come into being in various localities.

In choosing "The Home and School in Education" as the theme around which to build the program for its convention, the Oregon parent teacher association emphasizes the fact that there must be harmony between education in the home and education in the school.

The presence at the convention of two national presidents has stimulated unusual interest this year. Mrs. A. H. Reeve, who is president of the national congress of parents and teachers, is well known to both teachers and parents. Her work as editor of the Child Welfare Magazine has made her an outstanding figure in addition to her splendid leadership of the national organization of which she is the head.

Miss Mary McKimmon, president of the national educational association, has for many years been identified with educational movements. Her address Tuesday night at the opening session will be "When the School and Home
