

# BUTTER, EGGS EASIER; TOP OF MARKET PASSED

Portland, Oct. 27.—(AP)—While declines are only fractional, both butter and eggs are displaying an easier tone in the local market. Trading lacks the snap that has prevailed during the past several weeks, which leads many of the trade to feel that the top has been reached, at least for the time being.

On the dairy exchange today standard cubes were marked down a cent on the butter call, being posted at 54 cents. Other grades remained steady and unchanged. The supply of butter here is still short but the demand is less keen. In the fresh egg division, firsts declined a cent to 54 cents, while other grades remained steady at previous levels. As in butter, the supply of fresh eggs is limited and receipts are no more than sufficient to take care of this market's requirements. Cooler stocks, however, are still far ahead of holding a year ago at this time. With strawls are heavy.

An advance of 20 cents a barrel in all grades of flour is effective in the Portland market today. Country dressed meats and poultry are steady and unchanged; receipts moderate with light demand.

The local potato market is well established at \$2.75 for U. S. No. 1 Burbanks with some of the wholesale houses asking \$3 per hundred. Yakima Gems are bringing \$2.75 to \$2.85 on combination grades with U. S. No. 1 grade extremely scarce at \$3.25 to \$3.50. Oregon growers are holding their best potatoes at \$2.25 at shipping point.

Best globe onions are fractionally higher in the local produce market at \$2.25 with some stocks held as high as \$2.50. Bids at country points range from \$1.50@1.65 per hundred.

# COVERS LOGANS WITH STRAW TO PREVENT FREEZE

William McGilchrist, Jr., on the McGilchrist farm near Wheatland ferry, the old Phiz farm, is trying an experiment with loganberries this year which, if successful, may have considerable influence on the future of the loganberry crop in this section.

He has caused to be spread over a 10-acre patch of logans, over 50 tons of straw. The primary purpose is to ascertain if the straw can keep the logans from freezing. Incidentally he figures the straw will act as a fertilizer so if the main part of the experiment does not work out, it will not be a dead loss.

There are 55 acres of logans on the farm, probably making this one of the largest if not the largest of the individual plantings of loganberries left in the valley.

Last year he had 20 acres of the loganberries trained up when the freeze hit, and as a result he did not harvest a berry from the 20-acre patch. From the other 35 acres he took 50 tons. He figures that all told he should have taken 150 tons from the entire acreage.

He figures about half a crop was taken from the vines that were not trained up, but at that the vines were badly injured by the frosts.

"I am just guessing at it but I believe the straw covering will afford considerable protection. If we happen to have another freeze like last year we will at least get some idea as to how much good it does," stated McGilchrist. "There is a chance of the 10-acre patch being the best producer of all if my theories happen to work out. Anyway the fertilizing results from the straw repay some of the costs, no matter the result of the experiment."
