TRIAL OPENS WITH COURT CUT TO TEN

placed Major General Robert L. Howe, commanding officer of 133 Fifth corps area, at Columbus, Ohio, in the president's chair.

Only one preliminary challenge is permitted under the practice of court martial, but any number may be challenged for cause, as were Generals Sumner and Bowley. It is not required that the defendant state the reasons for a preliminary challenge.

Violations caused by challenges are not filled in army courts, the remaining members retaining full authority to act. With the challenges disposed of, therefore, the court was sworn, with its original membership of 13 reduced to 10.

Report introduced

Colonel Mitchell's Hawaiian report, which was read to the court as a part of the challenge against General Sumner, was dated December, 1923, and declared the air forces of the islands were badly organized, and that General Sumner had shown an ignorance of the principles involved.

In an appended statement by Colonel Mitchell, also read in court, the colonel said the report had indicated that General Sumner had practically nothing about aviation.

A copy of the report, Colonel Mitchell said, had been handed by him to General Sumner.

The case in behalf of Colonel Mitchell was opened by Mr. Reid with the reading of the statements the air officer made in San Antonio, Texas, September 5 and 9, charging "criminal neglect," "incompetence" and "almost treasonable" administration of the air service. It is upon this language that Colonel Mitchell is being tried on charges of "conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline."

These statements, Mr. Reid declared, did not constitute a violation of any article of war.

With Colonel Mitchell standing before the bench, Lieutenant Colonel Joseph I. McMillen, assistant trial judge advocate, then read the specifications against him.

MINGER FORGED NOTE, IS CLAIM

The case of John Minger against Louis Ashliman as executor of the estate of Adele Minger, came on for trial in circuit court today before a jury and presents sensational features, in that Minger, aged horticulturist and well known about the city and county, is charged by the defense with having forged a \$2000 note in order to participate in benefits to that amount from the estate of his wife.

The wife left an estate valued at about \$6000. According to the story told, the husband and wife quarreled about division of a sale of property and finally divided by Minger taking cash and the wife a mortgage. The mortgage represents the wife's share of the estate.

When Minger made claim to Ashliman, as executor of his wife's estate, for the \$2000 and presented the note he alleged his wife signed before her death, Ashliman refused to admit the claim, and set up the allegation of forgery.

Other litigation also has developed over the estate.

go before the people at a special election asking for authority to increase the amount of revenue. The main objection to the special election was that, once an increase amounting to more than 6 per cent should be granted, and the 6 per cent increase abandoned, it will become necessary to stage a special election every year. So long as the 6 per cent ruling is adhered to taxes for school funds may be levied without authority given by vote of the people.

On top of the natural increase in expenditure due to the increase in enrollment, the question for a raise in pay of teachers, which school board members admitted must be seriously considered, came up for serious discussion. The raise, if granted, will amount to about \$37,000 increase in annual expenditures. It was reported. Tentative estimate of the amount of increased cost of teachers' salaries this year over last year, will be about \$20,000 without the individual increases asked, Superintendent Hug reported.

The increase will be due to the slight raise in pay which the board allows to teachers who remain in the school system certain length of time, and to the addition of 9 teachers found necessary because of the increased enrollment. Three new teachers have been added at the senior high school, 5 at Parrish junior high school, one at Englewood and one at Richmond grade schools, Mr. Hug reported.

It was estimated that the increase allowed in revenue this year over last year will be about \$3600.

Weston was arrested for the crime 38 months after it was committed, when he was taken into custody on information furnished by George Stillwell and Joe Wilson, who were employed with Weston at a sawmill near Krug's home.

Stillwell declared that he was compelled by Weston to accompany him to Krug's cabin, but that he had no knowledge of the aged man who was to be killed. He testified that Weston struck Krug on the head and then tortured him in an effort to make him tell where his money was hidden, firing the cabin when Krug died. Joe Wilson's testimony was that Weston later confessed the crime to him. There was other testimony indicating that Weston Stillwell and Wilson were engaged in bootlegging and that Krug had knowledge of their activities and that the one reason for their wishing to get him out of the way was through the prosecution contending that robbery was the primary motive.

The state, to prove robbery the motive, submitted testimony that a note for \$200, made out to Krug and signed by W. S. Fullerton, was found among Weston's effects after his arrest. Also there was testimony that Weston had borrowed a revolver and threatened Krug's life.

The condition of Lute Savage, veteran guard at the state penitentiary who was shot in the prison break of Murray, Kelly and Willis, was today reported to be "well improved." His condition does not improve, which indicates that he gradually gets less and less chance to live. Since his powers of resistance continually grow weaker, it is reported by his physicians, Savage is being kept at the Salem hospital.
