STATE DENTAL COLLEGE ASKED

A department of dentistry to be maintained in connection with the medical college of the University of Oregon is urged in the annual report of the state board of dental examiners to Governor Pierce.

"The only dental institution in the state of Oregon, in the entire northwest for that matter," says the report, "is a privately owned and controlled institution." At the close of the fiscal year ending March 31, the report says there were 1933 dentists registered in the state, and seven dental office proprietors or managers. Of these 251 were non-residents of the state. During the year the licenses of six dentists were revoked for non-payment of annual registration fees.

DECKBACH SAYS NEW BLOOD CHIEF NEED OF VALLEY

That the Willamette valley is "just as good a drawing card as Florida, southern California or any other place," and should have a population many times its present population, was stated by Frank Deckebach in a speech before the Marion-Polk County Realtors association this noon.

GREEKS SAY EVACUATION COMPLETED

Assurances Given. Later came an urgent telegram from Athens timed 10:30 last night, declaring that although the Greeks had been compelled to delay their retirement the Greek government "in its strong desire to conform with the decision of the league," had given clear instructions to continue the retreat, despite the difficulties due to the presence of armed bands, because "it declined to spare human life."

In conclusion the government stated that it would neglect no steps to insure evacuation of Bulgarian territory at the hour fixed by the council (8 o'clock this morning, Paris time).

While Martin J. Durkin, Chicago gunman, was in a gun battle with Chicago police officers and detectives last night, Salem officers believed they were on his trail.

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COURT HELD QUALIFIED TO TRY CASE

Investigated the charges, as required by court martial regulations. No Charge Filed. "If Colonel Mitchell had been guilty of any offense," Mr. Reid said, "it should have been charged by his commanding officer at that time—Major General Ernest Hinds in charge of the eighth corps area at San Antonio.

The record does not show that General Hinds, or Brigadier General Roekenbach, commanding the district of Washington, thought any crime had been committed. The only trouble, he declares, were caused by bands of brigands outside Damascus and measures are being taken against these.

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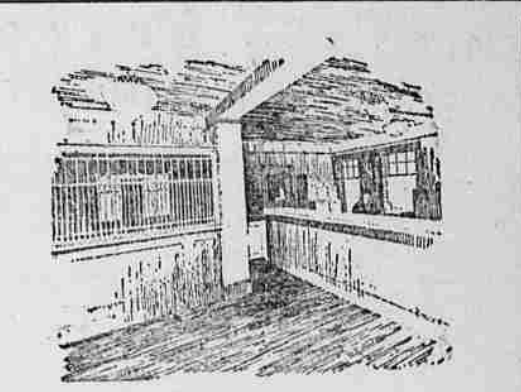
