Leola Fox had the misfortune to have two fingers badly cut while working at Willamette camp, Tuesday. One finger was entirely severed and he may lose the other.

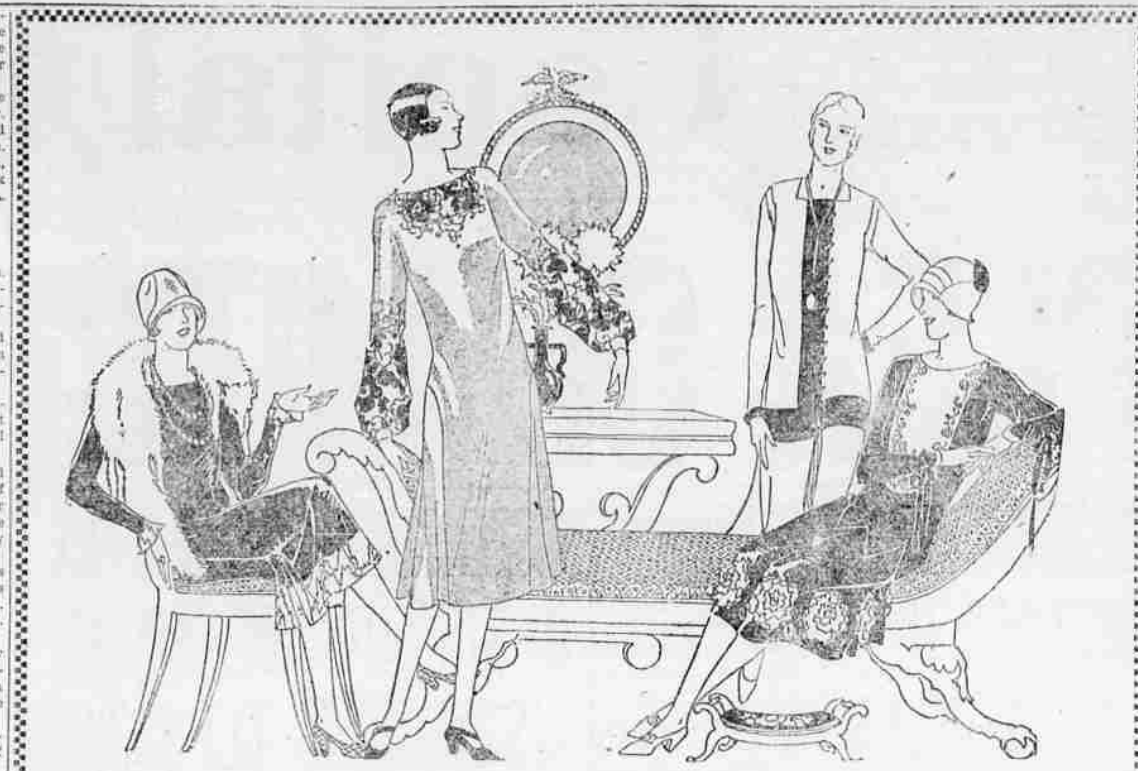

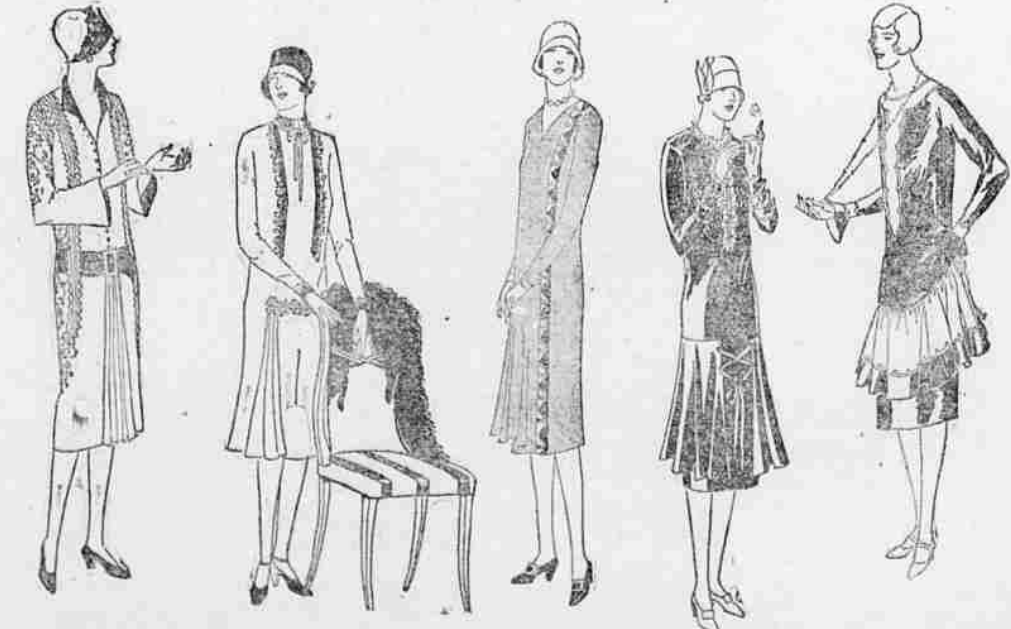
