

BEARCATS HOPE TO END JINX

SEE CHANCE FOR VICTORY OVER MISSIONARIES

The Bearcat football aggregation has a real chance Saturday to break the jinx held over it by the Whitman college squad, in the opinion of fans who have watched the progress of the local team during the past few weeks. Although practice on Sweetland has been secret except to newspapermen Tuesday and Wednesday nights, and has been announced as secret for the rest of the week, enough is known about the team to indicate that there has been a distinct improvement in its performance over the first of the season.

At last night's secret practice considerable attention was given to breaking up forward passes, the possibility being noted that Whitman may resort largely to an aerial offensive, particularly if they find the Bearcats weak in that line.

Coach Non-committal.
Guy Rathbun, Bearcat mentor, is non-committal as to the outcome of Saturday's encounter. "I think the two teams are fairly evenly matched," is all Rathbun will say about his team's prospects here Saturday.

Since football relations were established between the two schools six years ago, the record shows a straight string of wins for the Missionaries.

According to the dope Rathbun has on the Whitman aggregation, the Bearcats will line up against five three-year lettermen and two two-year lettermen on Sweetland field Saturday.

Team Shows Fight.
The Willamette team, consisting almost entirely of green men, is showing more scrap than any football team the school has turned out in recent years, despite distinctly lukewarm support by the student body. The main reason for the improvement this year is the fact that the squad has become thoroughly purged of a certain prima donnism—there is no one on the team this year who feels naturally good enough to be entitled to lie down on the job. There are no men on the squad who know more about the game than does the coach.

The Willamette line is expected to have as much in weight as the Whitman line, although no actual statistics are available. The Bearcat backfield, however, will probably be outweighed as well as being opposed by men with more experience in the game. Coach Whitman fullback and veteran of three years' experience, is looked for as a star of Saturday's game.

In the Bearcat line the exact personnel cannot be anticipated. In nearly every position Rathbun has a choice between two men, neither of whom is enough better than the other to make his position safe. It is probable, however, that Herrman, a new man in football circles, will start at right end, Huston at center, Mudra at right tackle, and Mort or Woodward at right guard. Stolzheko is looked for at left guard, Rhodes at left tackle and either Munford or Heldell at left end. Egan, Dlatson and others will probably be used in the line before the game is over.

Zeller a Mainstay.
In the backfield Clive Zeller, brother of Waldo, or "Fat" Zeller, the best man Willamette has turned out in recent years, will probably play most of the game at fullback. Winslow has been working out at quarterback. For right half Rathbun has Collingsworth and Swelling, the latter having more experience in the game, but having made a place on one of Dan Cupid's matrimonial teams late in the summer, was not a regular attendant at football practice this season. He has gone out regularly this week for the express purpose of beating Whitman and probably will be used in part of the game. Collingsworth, a freshman from eastern Oregon, has the speed and scrap, but lacks weight and experience. The position of left half will be filled by McMullin or Waddill.

The Bearcat aggregation is not

worrying about comparative records of the two teams. "Washington did not use a single one of its first string men who played against Nebraska in the game against Whitman," said Rathbun last night. The Huskies beat Whitman by some sixty odd points. Their score against the Bearcats at the start of the season was 193 to 0.

A year ago Whitman defeated Willamette by one point, the closest the Bearcats have ever crept up on the Missionaries. Last year's score was 7 to 6.

The Willamette team has a few minor injuries received in the College of Puget Sound game at Tacoma last Saturday. The experience, however, was well worth it, in Rathbun's belief. "I'd rather have the boys learn on College of Puget Sound than on Whitman," he said last night.

The game will mark homecoming day at Willamette.
