COUNTIES AGREE ON CONNECTING MARKET ROADS

Dallas, Or., Oct. 29.—The matter of a satisfactory connection between the Polk and Benton county market road projects to complete the Kings valley cutoff route to Newport was discussed Tuesday at a joint session of the Benton and Polk county courts at Dallas.

The Benton county representatives agreed that it was acceptable to them for Polk county to continue its market road to the west side of the railroad tracks from the Riner creek bridge, eliminating two railroad crossings as surveyed by County Engineer Howe. It will be necessary for Benton county to undertake some new construction to connect with this route at the county line, but not a great deal.

Polk county has about one mile of construction from the Riner creek bridge to the county line and plans to complete that next summer. Benton county has built several miles of highway on market road specifications from the connection of the Corvallis-Newport highway toward Kings valley and can probably complete the project next summer.

Judge Victor F. Moses, Commissioners A. W. Hawley and R. C. Von Lebe and Engineer Galloway made up the Benton county delegation.

SEEK DAMAGES FOR MILL ATTACHMENT

Dallas, Or., Oct. 29.—Sheriff T. E. Hooker, the Marion Auto company, Otto Teal, M. D. Hammel, Henry Keeney, Lester Keeney and A. B. Brown are named defendants in a suit filed Wednesday by Ira H. Sullivan and Thomas J. Sullivan who seek to be paid \$215.54 claimed to be due for timber and \$206.59 damages on a sawmill proposition operated by Brown. The suit is the result of attachment proceedings brought against the mill several months ago by the Marion Auto company.

The defendants in the suit were involved in a somewhat similar suit among themselves in a case tried in Marion county Monday. It arose out of the same attachment.

DALLAS BUDGET FOR NEXT YEAR SAME AS 1925

Dallas, Or., Oct. 29.—The 1925 budget for the city of Dallas, as prepared by the budget committee, is approximately the same as 1925, calling for the raising of \$24,907 by taxation as compared with \$24,776 in 1925. Monday, November 23, has been set as the date for a public hearing when any taxpayers interested may meet with the levying board to be heard for or against the appropriations listed.

The special committee of the council which prepared the budget, for submission to the budget committee had to do some very close figuring as estimated receipts are \$1000 less than last year and increased in some departments were imperative. The change made in the state law regarding the division of road tax money between county and city caused the drop in estimated receipts.

The fund for outstanding warrants was cut \$1000 from last year's figure, leaving \$500. The amount appropriated for various street purposes was reduced \$1170 from the \$1925 figure while \$59 was taken from the sewer appropriation and \$190 from the park board. It was found necessary to include an item of \$1200 in this year's budget to take care of purchase of land on which assessments become delinquent. An increase of \$300 was included for the city auditor in conformity with a recent ordinance passed by the council.

HEALTH CLINIC OPENS TUESDAY

Silverton, Oct. 30.—(Special)—The workers who are preparing for the health clinic will open here Tuesday of next week report that they are meeting with enthusiasm in their interview with the mothers. A committee is at work this week in securing the consent of the mothers to have their children attend the clinic. With the exception of a very few all of the mothers are more than glad to avail themselves of the opportunity of securing expert advice free of charge. The work will begin at Silverton Tuesday. At this time all of the pupils in the North Side school will be examined. On Wednesday the examinations will begin at the Eugene Field school. Six days will be devoted to the work here. During this time it is hoped that all of the children in the first to the third grade, inclusive, will be examined. Another clinic will be held for the older grades after the holiday. A number of mothers have expressed the wish that the committee, when the school children are completed, will carry the work into the homes and give the babies the benefit of the advice.

The committee in charge of this division of the health work at Silverton is composed of Miss Catherine Woodard as chairman with Mrs. Frank Rahn and Mrs. J. H. McCullough as assistants.
