McLAREN QUILTS PAROLE BOARD

Eugene, Or., Oct. 30.—Governor Pierce, while here yesterday, let it be known in reply to an inquiry that W. G. McLaren of Portland has resigned from the state parole board of which he has been a member for several years.

The reason for McLaren's resignation is presumed to be the fact that his son, Allan McLaren, has been sentenced to serve four years in the state prison for a statutory offense in Clackamas county. By order of the governor yesterday young McLaren was granted a 30-day respite before beginning his sentence, and the governor said the purpose of this was to give opportunity for a thorough investigation to ascertain if a pardon for the youth would be justifiable.

(Appointments of a member of the parole board to succeed Mr. McLaren and a state parole officer to succeed J. V. Starrett are now pending. Starrett resigned about two months ago because he could not agree with Warden Dalrymple.)

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LEGION WINS IN ARMISTICE DAY CONTROVERSY

Portland, Or., Oct. 30.—Portland will have an Armistice day parade at 11 a. m. Instead of a noon meeting and a parade at 7:30 p. m. as had been originally planned by a civic committee appointed by Mayor George L. Baker. The committee revised its plans as a result of strenuous protests by the American Legion to the night parade plan.

Portland business houses, the chamber of commerce, the retail merchants' association and the association of manufacturers' association, which had decided to keep business houses open on November 11, will be asked to reconsider the matter.

The action of the mayor's committee followed a decision reached Wednesday night by the legislative council of veterans' organizations of Portland to hold a parade at 11 a. m. on Armistice day.

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CLERK OF DESCHUTES COUNTY SUED BY WIFE

Bend, Or., Oct. 30.—Joseph H. Haner, Deschutes county clerk, has been sued by his wife, Marian Louise Haner, for divorce, the wife alleging that he has barred her at times from their home, has assaulted and choked her, and has refused to pay her bills for the last three months. They were married in 1898 and have two grown sons.

LACARNO PACT ONLY STARTER

London, Oct. 30.—(A. P.)—Ramsay MacDonald, former labor premier of Great Britain, returning home from a tour of central Europe, told the Herald's Brussels correspondent that, although the Locarno agreement was welcome as a first step, it in no wise settled the real problem of Europe.

"The real problem is in the east," Mr. MacDonald is quoted as saying.
