

### DEPOSITION OF SHAH OF PERSIA NOT SURPRISING

London, Nov. 2.—(A. P.)—The deposition of the Shah of Persia by the Persian national assembly "for the sake of the national welfare," caused no surprise here, but the action of the Mejlis on Saturday, in the overthrowing of the dynasty, had not been expected. The succession of some member of the family reportedly had been suggested when reports of Sultan Ahmed Mirza, the 27 year old Shah, were current.

Some doubt is expressed as to whether the abolition of the dynasty represents the feeling among the Persians, who are said to have the theoretical conception that the monarchy was strong. The voice of the people, it is thought here, will probably be heard on this point as soon as elections to the announced constituent assembly begin. Much, however, seems likely to depend on Premier Reza Khan, who is regarded as not a strong man, but possessed both of strategy and of statercraft. He will likely sound public opinion respecting the form of the new government. It is said he can afford to do this, as it is virtually certain he will retain all real power in Persia in any case.

There is a rumor in London that Reza has seized the throne himself, but this cannot be confirmed. A dispatch to the Morning Post from Teheran, the Persian capital, reports that the former crown prince left the city on Saturday for Paris accompanied by a detachment of soldiers. The dispatch adds that everything was quiet and that the city was to be illuminated for three nights as a sign of rejoicing.

Reza Khan has risen from a humble station. He formerly was a groom and subsequently a trooper in the Persian Cossacks. He suddenly gained prominence, when in 1921, he headed a military revolt which overthrew the government. Reza then became war minister and in 1923 premier. He declared himself in favor of a republic but was thwarted in his efforts to establish one by the opposition of the priests.

However, Reza has held power since that time and the virtual dictator, modeling his conduct in example of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, president of Turkey. Early in 1925, he induced the national assembly to appoint him commander in chief of the army. The Morning Post says the shah recently determined to return to Persia from his unlimited vacation in Europe and engaged a suit on a liner sailing for Persia but that he has cancelled his arrangements.

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### JAPANESE ROW OVER PROPOSED NAVY BUDGET

Tokyo, Japan, Nov. 2.—(A. P.)—The veritable newspapers are dilating today on the serious row between the finance and the navy departments over the apparent refusal of the finance minister to approve an appropriation of 23,000,000 yen for the replacement of auxiliary naval vessels in the next five years.

The finance minister contends that economic influences make such a huge appropriation impossible, but navy heads declare the safety of the country necessitates the replacement program.

### WAISTLINE FOR WOMEN BACK IN SPRING STYLES

Paris, Nov. 2.—The girl of last summer—the sprightly slip of boyish shapeliness has disappeared. Paris has banished her, admitting after several seasons of denial, that women have waists.

Mid-season models designed for Palm Beach and southern European wear, forerunner of the modes for next spring and summer, place the waist line very near normal. The belt not only has returned but is farther up than it has been for years.

Proud owners of 22-inch waists, however, need not yet begin to pinch them in, for although belts are back and nearly back where Eve's modiste placed them—they are not yet pulled in. They are simply here, as loose as the dress itself—more as a thing of decoration than of utility.

Fullness, moreover, does not spring from the waist line in between season models but from a point just below the hips.

### WILL KEEP EGAN ESTATE INTACT

The large William H. Egan estate, one of the old farm estates of the Willamette valley, will be kept intact, according to final account being filed by Albert J. Egan, son and executor, who states that while money on hand was not sufficient for the purpose a mortgage was executed in order to meet accumulated expenses against the estate and that disbursements have been made to meet all such claims.

The final account shows that the estate is possessed of real property in Marion county valued at \$27,500 and real property in Yamhill county of a \$2500 value, while personal property was valued at \$1555. The farm property of the estate in Marion county is north of here and the ranch is considered an exceptionally fine one.

### FIRE LOSSES IN STATE DURING 1925 REDUCED

A statement issued by State Forester F. A. Elliott shows that fires and fire losses within the state on lands coming under the jurisdiction of his office were far less than last year, and this in spite of the fact that a long extended dry period made conditions exceedingly favorable for disastrous fires. A total of 840 fires were suppressed by the field crew this year as against 1888 in 1924. Lightning is credited with the

greatest number, 186 in all, incendiaryism is second with 154 and smokers third with 107. One noteworthy feature of fire causes is the falling off in the number of hunter fires. Only 24 are credited to this cause and a number of them were caused by hunters who were in the woods before the season opened.

The small number is unquestionably due to the changing of the opening of the deer season from August 20 to September 10, thereby serving to keep hunters out of the woods during what is ordinarily a bad fire period," said the forester.

The total area burned over is placed at 51,144 acres, resulting in the destruction of 6,509,000 feet of timber, valued at approximately \$15,000. Logging operators suffered a loss of \$85,692, due to fires in their operations. Over half of this loss was caused by one fire which occurred the fore part
