

\$80,000 PAID TO 300 POLICEMEN BY LIQUOR RING

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Charges of graft involving 300 policemen and payments of \$80,000 a month have been made by Patrick H. O'Donnell, attorney for two members of the Genna gang, leaders of an alcohol ring, on trial for killing two policemen last June.

He offered as evidence to prove his charges, records which he said showed each policeman's star number opposite the amount paid him. Barred from introducing the evidence in the murder trial as irrelevant, O'Donnell said he would give his information to the federal government.

Some of the policemen took their pay in alcohol from the 15 plants controlled by the Gennas in the basement and tenement rooms on the west side, and bootlegged it themselves, O'Donnell said. Duplicate lists of the plants were furnished detective squads so that the place would not be raided by mistake.

The charges were made, the lawyer said, in an attempt to show that "most cordial business and personal relations" existed between the gang and the police and that Genna and his henchmen would not have attempted to kill any of them.

The graft charges were the second sensation of the trial, the first coming when two court attaches were discharged after they had accepted presents of whiskey from O'Donnell.

DURKIN ELUDES POLICE AGAIN

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Chicago detectives, who waited all night with steel shields, shotguns, bombs and pistols to storm a farm house in Lake county, Indiana, where Martin Durkin, slayer of two detectives, was thought hidden, had no success for their pains. Durkin was not in the house when it was raided at dawn.

Three men who claimed to know the escaped slayer told the cordon of armed officers that they had seen Durkin enter the house shortly after midnight.

The raiders believed their informants were mistaken rather than that Durkin might have escaped.

CORPORATION FORMED TO OPERATE WILHOIT

Oregon City, Or., Nov. 3.—A corporation to take over and operate the Wilhoit Spring resort, in the southern part of Clackamas county, has been formed with Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Electric power company, John Manning, Dr. McCorkle and J. Irvin, all of Portland, and Judge J. U. Campbell of this city as incorporators.

NEW SYSTEM OF TIMING GAME IS TO BE TRIED OUT

Providence, R. I., Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Watches will be discarded and periods will be measured by the number of plays to a period in a football game to be played here Saturday by Brown University and Boston University.

Saturday's game will be the first time the plan will have been used in an official intercollegiate contest.

Each of the four periods will be ended when forty plays by either or both sides have been affected. Watches will be used only in timing intermissions and time out for accidents or other causes.

Harry Coffin, Harvard, '19, and R. W. P. Brown, former Harvard coach and Brown strategist, claim for the play system that it will give a better balance to football games. In timed periods, they say, the first team to score can block games by legitimate plays leaving the opponent with almost no chance to score. They say that in 39 Harvard-Yale games the team scoring first won every game except that played in 1916.

Members of the football rules committee and leading eastern coaches are expected to watch Saturday's experimental game.

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SALEM TO PLAY AT HILLSBORO THIS WEEK END

Next Friday afternoon the Salem high school football eleven will travel to Hillsboro where they are to meet the high school team there.

The red and black eleven will be in much better shape for this game than in any other played so far. In nearly every game played this year the locals have had some handicap or other. West Linn was defeated easily in the first game of the season. In the Chemawa game the locals were sick and sore from vaccination which has still held out in all of the other games. B. Drager has been out of the last two games with smallpox which has left the team without any quarter. Lyons was shifted to quarter without any practice, the team

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using the huddle system. In the Albany game Olinger has been trained as quickly as possible for the place but had to be taken out of the game when he was severely shaken up which again left the team without a quarter. B. Drager will still be out of the game with Hillsboro and possibly for the rest of the football season.

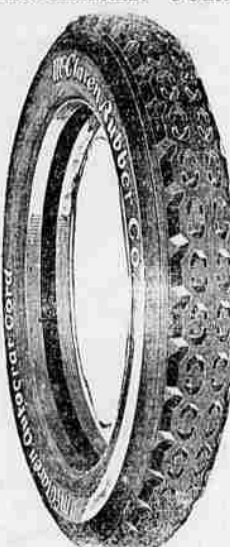
