## Foreign Students to Be Guests

Students who are natives of foreign countries will be honor guests at a reception on Friday evening when Chemeketa chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Salem Woman's club will be hostesses at a joint reception in the Woman's clubhouse on north Cottage street. The members of the Cosmopolitan club at Willamette university will give a program of foreign music and foreign poetry during the evening. ## Pioneer Family Has Reunion

Members of the pioneer Judson family met at the James French home at Zena on Sunday for the observance of four birthday anniversaries. The honor guests were Mrs. S. A. Judson whose seventieth birthday was celebrated yesterday, James A. French, 57, Anna Judson French, 51, and Jeanne Judson, aged five.

Four generations of the family of the late S. A. Judson were included in the group. S. A. Judson was born in Salem on April 12, 1842, and was the first white child born within the corporate limits of what is now Salem. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis H. Judson, came to Oregon in June, 1840, with the Jason Lee mission group. Mrs. S. A. Judson and her brother, George W. McBea, of Dallas, are the last living children of John McBea, another Oregon pioneer.
