

PRINCETON AND HARVARD CLASH NEXT SATURDAY

New York, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—With the scales and brasses of a strenuous week-end's play partially heated by a two-day rest, college gridiron educators today began intensive preparation for long-awaited struggles in the closing half of the campaign on the eastern front.

Final October games did much to clarify the football atmosphere at the cost of prestige to Army, Navy, Pennsylvania and Dartmouth and to the profit of a great Yale machine whose strength in previous games has been obscured to a great extent by fumbling. For that reason, fandom turned with more than ordinary interest to the evening battle of the Princeton-Harvard-Yale series Saturday at Princeton, bringing together the Tiger and Crimson elevens.

Indications were today that both teams would be at full strength Saturday.

Tiger fans were cheered by the appearance at practice of Quarterback Caulkins, who was believed to have been hurt Saturday.

Although the Harvard squad was reported in good physical condition, only six new today were sure of their positions in a lineup which has been undergoing a succession of changes.

Naught by failure of the team to realize hopes of the historic Brown eleven, Dartmouth coaches drove the Green squad through a fierce drill in preparation for their major struggle Saturday with undefeated Cornell.

Yale had further cause for rejoicing today when Butterworth, tackle, and Cutler and Kline, injured backs, reported in fair condition. Few of the regulars are expected to be used against Maryland on Saturday.

ACCUSE FRENCH OF REPRISALS

Alexandria, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—A traveler arriving here from Damascus states that the French bombarded three villages near Damascus last Wednesday in reprisal for acts of brigandage.

The French estimate that 1200 people were killed in the bombardment incidental to the suppression of the recent insurrection in the city, referred only to those found dead in the streets, the traveler asserts, as additional bodies to the number of 440 were discovered in the ruins of houses.

Lutfi Haffi, president of the Damascus chamber of commerce, is said to have been shot by Senegalese soldiers for carrying a revolver, the Senegalese being unable to read his permit.

DELAY ASKED IN TRIAL OF THREE MOONSHINERS

W. E. Critchlow, Portland attorney, has filed a motion in circuit court asking that the cases of John Andrew, Lester Dickson and Henry Johnson, alleged Mt. 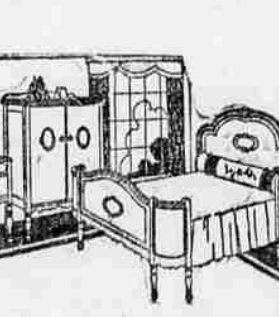
