PICK MEDFORD FOR '26 MEET OF ASSESSORS

Dallas, Or., Nov. 4.—Medford was selected as the next annual meeting place of the county assessors' association or Oregon and J. B. Coleman of Jackson county was elected president of the association for the coming year at the annual meeting held in Dallas, Tuesday, W. J. Lee of Klamath county and D. O. Hayes of Josephine county were elected vice-president and secretary-treasurer, respectively. A three-day session will be held some time during October next year with visits to Klamath Falls and Grants Pass.

The meeting in Dallas was one of the best attended since the association was formed. There were 29 assessors present and 15 deputies.

The morning session was given over to a general program, with outside speakers and the afternoon to a business session. The time available during the afternoon precluded all business except election of officers, the authorization of a legislative committee and a general discussion of problems.

The association members were guests at noon of the Dallas chamber of commerce at a luncheon at the Hall hotel. They were then taken on a tour of the industrial district, visiting the plant of the Gerlinger Machine & Locomotive Works, the Willamette Valley Lumber company mill, the Southern Pacific shops, and the California Packers corporation prune processing plant.

At the morning session George T. Gerlinger, general superintendent of the Willamette Valley Lumber company, spoke on general assessment of timber; Edward J. Hines, Dallas civil engineer, on official examination of deeds prior to recording; and C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, on the assessment of intangible wealth. In the afternoon C. L. Starr spoke on the centralization of the assessing power.

The session was presided over by H. U. Welch of Multnomah county, president of the association. Fred Holman, Polk county assessor, acted as host to the visitors.
