C., was announced today in Vancouver, by Mrs. T. W. B. London, Mrs. Rodgers' cousin, with whom Miss Rodgers is visiting at the present time.

Miss Rodgers is one of the most popular members of the younger set in Salem and has been widely entertained in Portland and in the Puget Sound cities. She was graduated from Vassar college and studied sculpturing in New York and in Paris. Her freshman year in college was spent at the university in Eugene, where she was a member of Kappa Alpha Theta. She spent last year abroad.
