IF YOU WERE A CITY COUNCILMAN?

I would turn my efforts would be the "hick town" method of handling through traffic in Salem. Of all of the principal cities along the Pacific highway Salem remains as almost the single instance of those failing to give the right-of-way to through highway traffic.

If the location of automobile accidents in the city as reported in the newspapers is an accurate indication of where the most danger of collision exists there is every reason why the route of the highway through the city should be over through traffic "stop" streets.

Practically all of the accidents about these streets are to be traced to the practice of motorists driving in from side streets without giving oncoming cars due clearance.

The argument that the "stop" signs on side streets leading into the highway delay traffic entering the highway is more than offset by the time saved by the cars so delayed after they have entered the highway. The system centralizes parallel traffic on a single artery, allows it to move smoothly along and serves as a protection to motorists and pedestrians.

Along this same line, I would seek to have safety zones for passengers alighting and boarding street cars in the downtown district that would allow automobiles to move by unhampered.

The present necessity of stopping when a streetcar stop is principally responsible for traffic congestion on the downtown streets, which is particularly dangerous when the pavements are wet.

A word to the city traffic officers to keep a closer eye on the drivers of delivery cars who shoot in and out around the city without regard for traffic regulations might also be beneficial if coming from the council.

SAFETY ALWAYS.

Number Three. Editor Journal—your idea for a contest for councilmanic ideas is an interesting one and should bear good fruit.

Personally, I suggest, that Salem has reached the stage where the city council may play a large hand in whether it is to become a real city soon, or whether this certain goal is to be postponed. While this is more or less generally, I believe the first duty of a councilman is to exert every effort toward the development of the city. This

In a negative way, as well as a positive way. As a concrete example, when a new industry such as the newly organized paper converting company knocks at the door seeking admission, it should be given every impetus to come here, rather than find its journey made hard by petty blockades.

I would urge active work in such measures as the zoning system, an immediate concrete bridge program, including the opening of Liberty street through from north to south, with a concrete bridge on every street where a bridge is needed, and a beautification program for the main highways.

Salem has the immediate opportunity of a rapid growth if it accepts the challenges. A member of the city council may play a large part in putting it over.
