SCHOOLS IN POLK GET HOLIDAY OF 3 DAYS NEXT WEEK

Dallas, Or., Nov. 5.—Dallas will be the scene of all teachers of the county on Monday and Tuesday, November 8 and 9, at a two-day teachers' institute, according to announcement of Josiah Wills, county school superintendent. The institute, preceding the Armistice day holiday, will make a three-day holiday in all schools of the county.

The sessions will be held in the Dallas junior high school building, E. F. Carleton, Frank Brumbaugh and A. C. Strange are among the educators on the program. Others who will discuss important subjects before the institute are Elizabeth Perry of Columbia county, Naomi C. Hagensen, Mona D. Sheldahl and Marie Connolly.

The election of officers in the county teachers' association and the selection of delegates to the annual state teachers' meeting will take place Tuesday morning. Miss Helen J. Gordon, Miss Margaret Friar and Miss Opal Robb, all of Dallas, will contribute musical selections as a part of the program of the two days.

The annual teachers' institute, which was abolished by the legislature in 1923, was restored in 1925 with a two-day instead of a three-day session. During the past two years a number of one-day institutes have been held on Saturdays at various parts of the county.

Dallas, Or., Nov. 5.—Dallas and Polk county golf enthusiasts who have been carrying on considerable agitation for a golf and golf links in this vicinity are having an opportunity this week to put their name on the dotted line.

Lee E. Smith of the Alderbrook golf course, Tillamook, and D. C. Craig of Rockaway are presenting a proposition whereby they will establish an 18-hole course at Brunk's corner, midway between Independence and Monmouth. The Tillamook county men propose to acquire 150 acres who will contribute \$60 for the first year and \$4 per month thereafter before proceeding with the plans for a club.

They are placing their proposition before Dallas, Monmouth, Independence and Salem. The proposed course would be only seven miles from Salem with a paved road all the way.
