The finger healed so slow that Hollis Huntington, coach, would not allow him to get into the game until this week. B. Drager, Salem quarterback, is still out of the game.

Ollinger was substituted for Drager in the last game but was hurt in the head on the first play and Huntington is a little leary of putting him in this fray, fearing that he might hurt himself again. Lyons, who has been at quarter since Ollinger and Drager were out, was unable to appear for practice Wednesday due to illness. J. Drager has not been feeling well but is expected to be in the game.

The locals have been working hard to get into shape for this game as they are expecting a hard game. The line is in fine shape with the exception of John Drager at tackle and the backfield is rounding into form. B. Drager's services at quarter will be missed, however.

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ELK HUNTING SPORT IN MONTANA RESERVE

Great Falls, Mont., Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—Hundreds of elk, driven from the mountains into the accessible canyons and flats in search of food, are being killed by hunters in the Lewis and Clark reserve, where the hunting season opened last Sunday.

Three elk were killed from the door of a cabin on Big Gorge flat and all about the region the animals are reported by hunters to be as thick as cattle and easy to shoot.

Game Warden Hill today expressed the opinion that the killing of the animals would prevent wholesale starvation of them later on. Hunters report that deer are plentiful as the elk and are being slain in numbers nearly as great.

ANTI-JAPANESE LAW RECEIVES SET BACK

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—Efforts of Washington to bar Japanese from controlling land were repulsed yesterday by the state supreme court.

The commonwealth gained decisions in superior court here that a 60-year lease of J. T. Kusumi on 10 acres and possession by Ryoten Jura of eight acres were invalid. The lower court ordered both tracts, which are near here, to escheat to the state.

The higher tribunal denied the state's contention that a series of transfers on each tract ending in the claims upheld had been effected through dummies.

LOTTERY SUGGESTED TO SOLVE FRENCH DEBT

Paris, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—A nationwide lottery to extricate France from her present financial difficulties is advocated in a resolution adopted Wednesday by the "republican union," a group of senators which comprises former President Poincare, former President Millerand, former Premier Francois Marsall, Henry Cherou, former minister of agriculture, and other notable men.

The senators emphasized the fact that they favor a lottery this one time only and take the stand that it should not have a permanent character allowing the government to resort to such a measure at the end of any year when it finds itself faced by a deficit.

The "republican union" has 55 members in the senate and wields an important influence in that house.

SAY SITUATION IN SYRIA STILL SERIOUS, CLAIM

London, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—The situation in Syria still is tense and apparently fraught with grave possibilities. Reports reaching London assert that there has been renewed fighting in the eastern outskirts of Damascus between the French and rebels and that the French are using all efforts to prevent the entry into the city of the tribesmen on the outside.

Barricades, including wire entanglements, have been erected in the streets of Damascus by the French, who are declared to be short of troops and are enrolling Kurds and other natives to aid them.

To the north of Damascus it is reported that rebels have concentrated and from various sections come advices that the situation is growing worse. The entire area from Damascus northward to Aleppo is declared to be held by Brigands and Homs is said to be seething with insurrection.

"Uncontrolled rebellion," says one correspondent, "seems to be sweeping the entire country. The French forces cannot possibly cope with the situation owing to inadequate numbers. No improvement seems possible until reinforcements arrive. Even the defenses of Damascus could not resist a strong organized attack."

The French are using both artillery and airplanes against the tribesmen.

CHEMAWA PLAYS COLUMBIA NEXT

Chemawa, Or., Nov. 5.—Next Saturday afternoon the Chemawa Indians will go to Portland where they will meet the Columbia university eleven. The Indians have had the benefit of two weeks rest and they are hoping to come back with the larger score.

The Columbia game is regarded as their toughest struggle of the season and if they are able to get

over this one they will be confident of cleaning up all their opponents this season. So far the Redskins have not lost a game.

Coquille Thompson, big Indian full, and Paul Keta, who were injured in the Salem high and Albany college games, will be able to back in the lineup it is thought. Their return to the game will add materially to the Redskins' chances. Solomon Fleury, half for the Indians, is going even better than he did earlier in the season and is expected to gain considerable yardage for the locals.

Several other hard games remain on the Indians' schedule but they are pointed for the Columbia game until that time they think of nothing else.

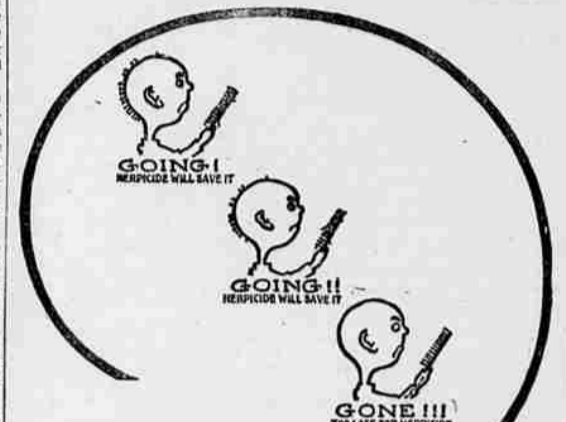

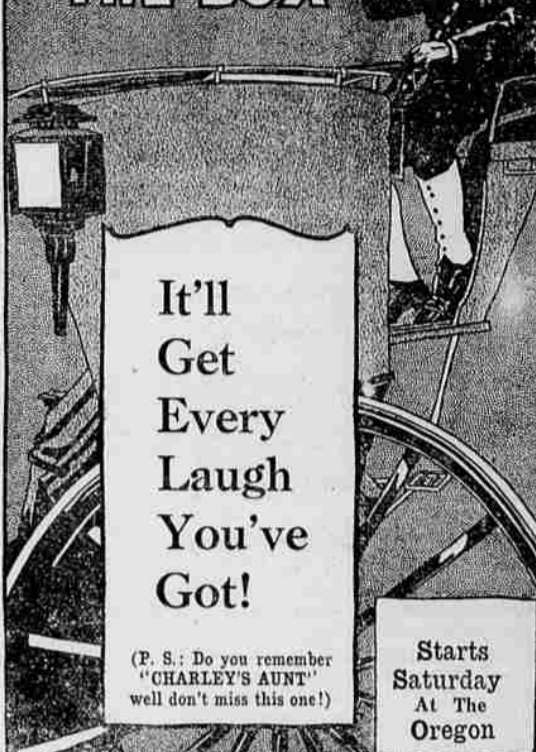

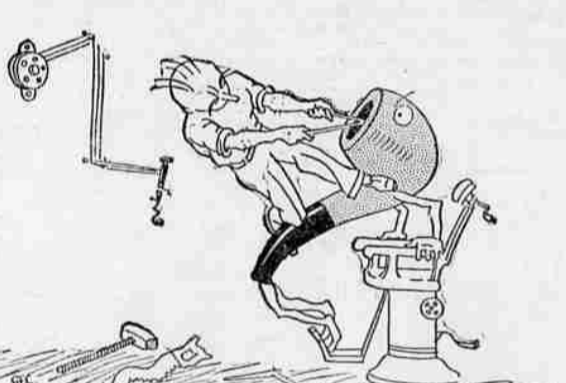
