

STATE SECURES \$168,804 FROM FOREST RENTALS

The state of Oregon has been allowed \$168,804.26 by the federal government as the state's 25 per cent of the returns from national forest rentals, timber sales and other sources of national forest income for the fiscal year 1925, according to a letter received by Governor Pierce from L. F. Knapp, national federal forester. The money, when received by the state treasurer, will be apportioned to the counties according to the acreage of federal forest lands in the counties. The apportionment by forest reserves and counties is as follows: Cascade national forest—Acreage in Douglas and Lane counties, 14,423.29.

Crater national forest—Acreage in Douglas, Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties, 44,754.52.

Dechutes national forest—Acreage in Dechutes, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties, 116,791.75.

Fremont national forest—Acreage in Klamath and Lake counties, 15,291.92.

Klamath national forest—Acreage in Jackson county, 116.28.

Malheur national forest—Acreage in Baker, Grant, Harney and Malheur counties, 46,137.50.

Mount Hood national forest—Acreage in Clackamas, Hood River, Jefferson, Marion, Multnomah and Wasco counties, 15,774.01.

Ochoco national forest—Acreage in Crook, Grant, Harney and Wheeler counties, 43,444.44.

Santiam national forest—Acreage in Clackamas, Jefferson, Lane, Lin and Marion counties, 44,429.11.

Siskiyou national forest—Acreage in Douglas, Coos, Curry and Josephine counties, 14,486.03.

Siuslaw national forest—Acreage in Benton, Coos, Douglas, Lane, Lincoln, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill counties, 22,990.96.

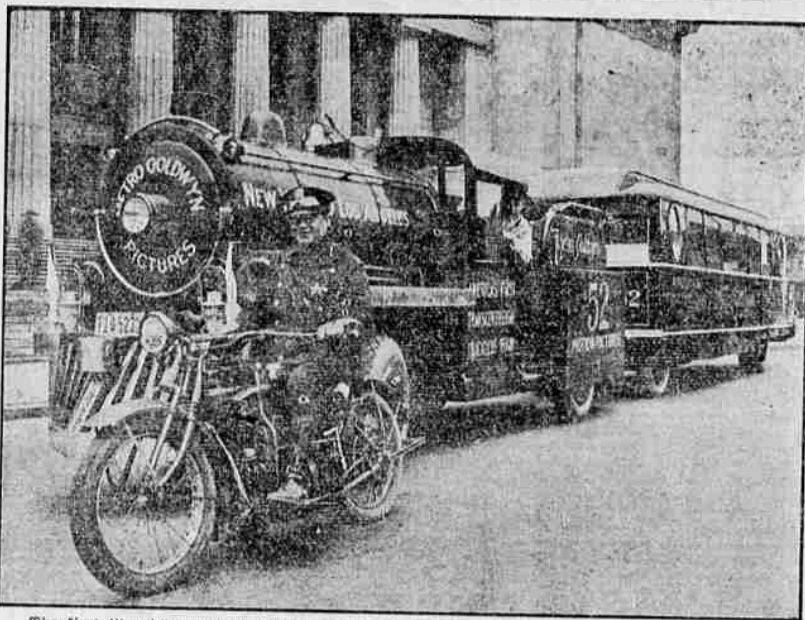
Umatilla national forest—Acreage in Grant, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler counties, 45,515.81.

ATTACK ON GAS TAX NOT BACKED BY STAGE LINES

According to J. W. Parker, manager of the Parker stage line and a member of the Oregon Motor Stage Association, the organized stage operators of the state are not in sympathy with the attack on the gasoline tax made by Mr. W. R. Crawford in the United States courts in behalf of certain Oregon interests.

Mr. Crawford seeks to have the United States courts invalidate the law of Oregon providing for the present gasoline tax which is used for the construction and maintenance of the highways.

Mr. Parker states that the stage operators of this state, through the Oregon Motor Stage Association, representing 95 per cent of the stage interests of Oregon, have several times gone on record publicly and officially, as being in favor of, not only the present gasoline tax, but an increase in this tax if additional funds are needed for construction and maintenance of highways, their position being that the gasoline tax, together with a

license fee based on the weight of vehicles, is the fairest and most equitable measure of the use of and damage to the highways so far devised or suggested.
