LIBERALS SEEK STRENGTH TEST

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 6.—(A. P.)—It is the purpose of W. Mackenzie King, the premier to go before parliament with his cabinet, notwithstanding the fact that the liberals, of which party he is the leader, are in the minority in the house of commons, in consequence of the recent general election.

This announcement was made last night by Mr. King in a lengthy statement, in which he took the ground that although the conservatives led by Arthur Meighan had 115 seats in the chamber as against 102 for the liberals, this was far from indicating that Mr. Meighan was in a position to command a majority of the members. In fact, Mr. King added, the results of the election "appear clearly to indicate that he is not in such a position."

CHAIN OF DEPARTMENT STORES TO SPAN COAST
