

SILVER CUP FOR LARGEST CIRCLE GIVEN SILVERTON

Silverton, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—The parent-teacher's association met in regular session Thursday afternoon at the high school auditorium. A large number of members were present. Prior to the meeting Miss Lavella Yanise, domestic art instructor, held an exhibition of the work done so far in her department. At this time 24 pieces of underwear and eight wool dresses were on display. A style show will be a feature of the department during the winter. Miss Yanise also announced that the cafeteria at the high school will open before Thanksgiving.

At the parent-teacher's association meeting plans for assisting in the purchase of a piano for the high school were discussed. No definite decision on this matter was reached. It is understood that the association will assist the student body in the purchasing of this piano.

Mrs. Helen Wrightman then presented the silver cup which the Silverton Parent-Teacher association won at the state convention at Portland for having the largest paid up membership outside of Portland. Mrs. John Hoblit, president of the Silverton circle, accepted the cup. Mrs. Ira Steward, chairman of the membership committee, gave a pleasing report

showing that Silverton had 220 paid members.

Mrs. LeRoy Lemmon then announced that she had the layettes cut out and these were distributed among the women who will make them. They are to be a part of the loan cloze which the parent-teacher association maintains for the assistance of the health welfare council of Silverton.

NORTHWEST AIR MAIL CONTRACT SIGNED BY NEW

Washington, Nov. 7.—(AP)—The first contract for carrying the mails by airplane was signed Friday by Postmaster Gen. New with Walter T. Varney of San Francisco, for daily, except Sunday service each way between Elko, Nev., and Pasco, Wash., by way of Boise, Idaho.

Service will begin as soon as the contractor can comply with requirements.

The route will expedite mail to

and from Portland, Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane and other Pacific northwest cities by making connection with the trans-continent air mail at Elko, and with overnight trains at Pasco. The contractor will receive 80 per cent of the postage.

The schedule calls for planes to leave Elko at 11:15 a. m., upon the arrival of the trans-continent air mail plane, arrive at Boise at 1:55 p. m. and at Pasco at 4:35 p. m. Southbound planes will leave Pasco at 8 a. m., arrive at Boise at 10:50 a. m. and at Elko at 1:10 p. m.

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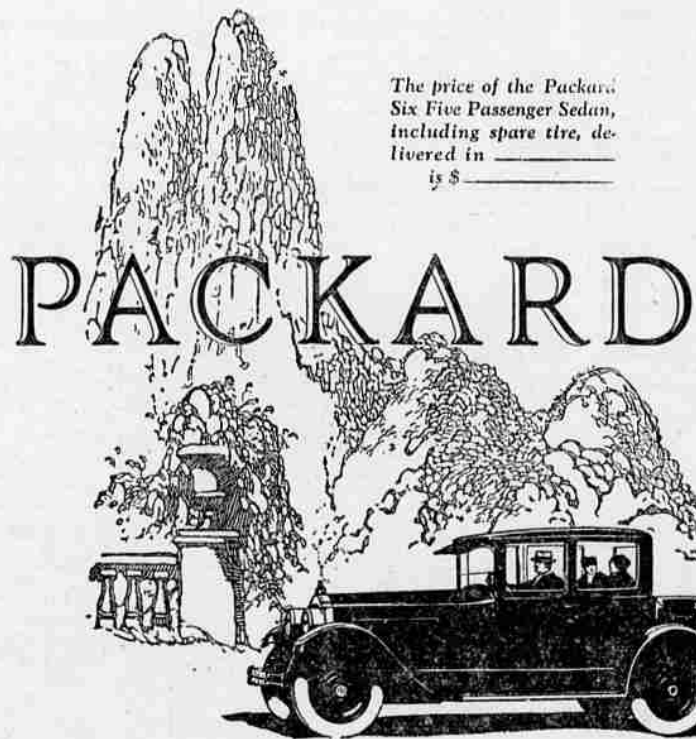

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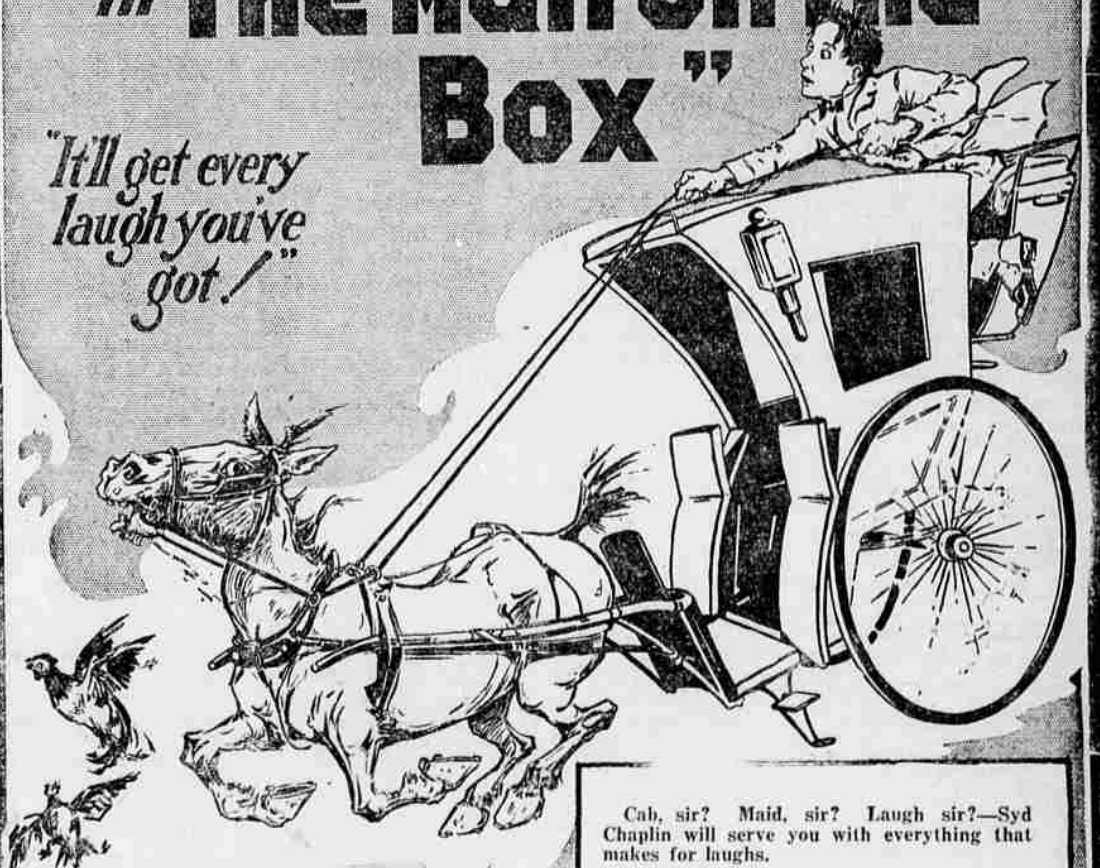
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
