ACCIDENT FATAL TO JESSE LOTER

His death said to be a result of an infection of the hand caused by an injury sustained about a month ago, Jesse Jacob Loter passed away at his home last evening. He had been an special-carrier of the Capital Journal for some six years.

The accident which is reported to have eventually resulted in his death took place on the bridge on South Church street just north of the blind school. Loter was going north just after dark, returning to Salem from delivering his bundles of papers for the day. Driving at a moderate rate of speed, he was blinded by the headlights of a car going in the opposite direction, and inadvertently let his own light touring swerve into the falling of the east side of the bridge. Part of the railing was thrust through the windshield and struck Loter in the hand. The car was considerably damaged, and the man himself was badly shaken, but it was thought at the time that injury to him would not prove fatal. He was taken to a hospital for a day, going from the hospital to his home, 1200 North 21st street. An infection soon set in on the injured hand, with the result that Loter's condition eventually became serious, and late yesterday resulted in his death.

In addition to carrying bundles of the Capital Journal he occasionally delivered special delivery mail from the local post office.

Funeral services will be held Monday at two o'clock.

STEIWER HERE, SAYS OUTLOOK IS PROMISING



Fred Steiwer of Pendleton, first of the republican senatorial candidates to come into this territory in the present campaign, today expressed himself as highly encouraged with the sentiment he has found in his favor since he left his home city of Pendleton more than a week ago. 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CONFIDENCE OF BEARCATS ENDS IN 3 TO 0 DEFEAT

Out laying the Bearcats at nearly every stage of the game, the Linfield college football team defeated Willamette 3 to 0 on Sweetland field here Friday afternoon.

With the exception of a time or two in the first quarter, and at the end of the fourth quarter following the Linfield goal from the field, the game was all Linfield's, and the Bearcats were lucky to get off with the score as close as it was.

A lack of aggressiveness on the field, caused by a superiority complex, is given as the reason for the Bearcat's downfall. Beginning with the second quarter, when the visitors began to get the edge on the locals, the Linfield team made consistent gains through the heavier Willamette line. On defense, the Linfield forwards broke thru again and again, throwing Willamette back for losses.

One pass was intercepted, the Linfield score following shortly afterward. The play came in the fourth canto, and the ball was in Willamette's possession on the Bearcat 29 yard line, following an unsuccessful attempt by Linfield to make a goal from the field. From his own 20 yard line Reidel passed back for losses.
