

BUTTER AND EGG PRICES STEADY MARKET EASIER

Portland, Ore., Nov. 7.—(A.P.)—Butter and egg prices were unchanged on the local dairy board at the close of the week and the market closed generally steady in both lines.

During the past week the fresh cream market has been a little easier with top grades closing a cent lower than last Saturday. Extras are down to 55 cents and firsts at 52 cents. Other grades are unchanged.

Portland millers have announced an advance of \$1 a ton in millrun and middling effective today. New prices are \$23 and \$49 respectively.

The local potato market is still firm and values well maintained although most of the excitement over high prices has disappeared.

The onion market continues firm with very little fancy Sherwood stock being offered. Produce firms ask \$2.50 with growers generally holding around \$1.65 to \$1.75 in the country.

The local wool market is showing some activity. Close to 500,000 pounds have changed hands this week.

ROBERTS SELLS HOP RANCH NEAR INDEPENDENCE

S. B. Walker, for many years associated with his brother, W. H. Walker, in growing hops, has closed a deal for the purchase of what is known as the Percival ranch on the Marion county side of the river, from John Roberts of Salem, says the Independence Enterprise.

There are about 60 acres in the ranch, 48 being in trellised hops. It is equipped with four hop houses and a barn, and is regarded as one of the very best yards in the district. Sole ownership was acquired by Mr. Roberts about a year ago at the time he and T. A. Akeley split up their partnership holdings, and the only reason Mr. Roberts had for selling it was his isolation from his other hop holdings.

The Walkers are accumulating hop yards. Mr. Walker's son, Dean, purchased the E. M. Young yard north of town this fall. Dean and his brother, Ray, own and operate a good sized yard on the east side of the river.

The consideration of the Roberts sale has not been announced. Another real estate of considerable magnitude is the sale by S. B. Walker to his brother, W. H. Walker, of his interest in the Walker Bros. hop ranch, which is located just north of town. This firm has been in the hop game for a long time.

STOCK PRICES SLUMP SHARPLY AFTER ADVANCE

New York, Nov. 7.—(A.P.)—Stock prices reacted sharply today after an early demonstration of strength had attracted many investors into new high ground for the year on gains of one to four points. With United States Steel selling at the highest price in its history, heavy buying was attracted from many quarters, quickly elevating it to a new peak at 139 1/2 before it crumbled under an avalanche of week end realizing sales.

High records were established by General Motors at 149 3/4 U. S. Rubber at 89 1/2, Allied Chemical at 113 1/2, Texas Gulf Sulphur at 121 1/2 and Schulte Cigar Stores at 125.

These gains were wiped out when the market turned downward in the final hour, with pronounced weakness developing in the motors and high priced specialties. General Motors reached to 145 1/2, General Electric fell from 338 to 330 and Dupont from 270 to 259, while Woolworth Hudson and U. S. Cast Iron Pipe sold 3 to 4 points below previous closing figures.

500,000 POUNDS OF WOOL IS SOLD Portland, Nov. 7.—With wool growers and buyers getting closer together on prices, business is increasing in volume in the territory. Over half a million pounds have changed hands in the past week.

The largest transaction this fall was closed yesterday when E. J. Burke purchased the F. W. Gooding clip of 250,000 pounds of Idaho wool, which has been stored at the Western Wool warehouse in this city. The lot, which was good mixed Idaho wool, is understood to have brought 44 cents.

The Western Wool warehouse also has 750,000 pounds more of Idaho wool for which the holders ask a higher price.

Among the sales reported in the country yesterday was the Kuhna clip of 100,000 pounds of Echo, which brought about 39 cents. Business was also reported in the Hopewell district.

Buyers are making offers more freely for northwestern wool, but as a rule growers are holding their clips above the market.

REVISED FRUIT RATES ARE HELD UNREASONABLE Washington, Nov. 7.—(A.P.)—Rates on livestock moving to Tacoma and Seattle from central and eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho were held by the interstate commerce commission today to be unfair as compared with rates to North Portland, Ore.
