JOHNSON SEES PLOT TO KILL PROHIBITION

"Pussyfoot" Declares Wet Meeting In Washington Sponsored And Financed By Europeans.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—(A.P.)—William E. "Pussyfoot" Johnson, international temperance lecturer, today said he believed a European plot to overthrow prohibition law, is forming to be launched at a gathering of wet advocates at Washington next January 16.

Johnson's information was given today by Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington, secretary of the World League Against Alcoholism, one of the principal speakers at the Anti-Saloon League convention in session here.

The report of Pussyfoot Johnson follows:
Seek to Recruit Trade.
"The American anti-prohibition demonstration announced for Washington, D. C., January 16, will be engineered from Europe and financed (or it will be provided) chiefly by European distillers and brewers."

"Made desperate by the inroads that the new American service for the elimination of rum row have made on European bootlegging enterprises, German brewers and distillers, flanked by the liquor interests of Belgium, France and Czechoslovakia, are preparing to launch a far-reaching effort to break down and discredit the American prohibition law. This movement is being led by the international Verein Zur Hebung Der Freien Alkohol Erzeugung (The Free Alcohol Erzeugung League) of which I am secretary for the liberty to make alcohol in every country."

Tells of Details.
"This drive was launched on September 23 in a general meeting of the society held at Dortmund, Germany. The meeting was presided over by Frederic Garnot, a wealthy distiller of Brussels, and was attended by representatives of the anti-prohibition demonstration in the city of Washington on January 16, 1926."

"This Washington gathering will be held ostensibly under the direction of American organizations opposed to prohibition, but the real movement will be engineered from Europe and the financial backing will be provided chiefly by Wilhelm Rosenkrantz, Franz Braun and Wilhelm Kiesecke of Berlin, but the flower dealers of all of the central European countries will combine their funds for this great drive into America."

"The leading brewery interest behind the scenes is centered around the Schullheiss brewery concern of Berlin. Fritz Schulheiss, director of this concern, and his nephew, Otto, have engineered several bootlegging enterprises in America, some of which have come to grief recently."

RESTORATION OF BAVARIAN KING SOUGHT

Plan to Restore Monarchy As Ruler Revealed By Berlin Newspaper.

Berlin, Nov. 9.—(A.P.)—Plans for an attempt to restore the Bavarian throne, with former Crown Prince Rupprecht as king, have been shelved because the "time is not ripe" for such a coup, the Frankfurter Zeitung learns on what it terms unimpeachable authority.

The paper declares that two weeks ago Baron Von Soden-Fraunhofen, Rupprecht's chief of cabinet, and General Moehle, former commander of the Bavarian government, were asked what attitude they would adopt if Rupprecht were to proclaim himself king of Bavaria. The time had come to act, they said and various organizations formed by General Moehle were ready.

The Bavarian government, according to the papers account, promptly gave Rupprecht's advisers to understand that the step proposed by the monarchists would be regarded as an attempt at revolution, and would be opposed by every means. It also was pointed out that the contemplated push would inevitably mean the loss of the palatinate from Germany.

Rupprecht's agents retired and informed their chief, the paper said, that the time was not ripe for a restoration of the Bavarian monarchy.

Poses Follow Fresh Lead In Hunt For Cons

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 9.—(A.P.)—Receiving a report that three men had obtained something to eat this morning near Touchet, Wash., 20 miles west of here, Warden Clarence Long of the state penitentiary ordered all available forces of guards and sheriff's deputies to center their effort in that district and is hourly hoping for an early capture of the three long-termers, one a murderer, who made a sensational escape from the prison at 12:50 Sunday morning.

The prisoners who escaped are: Warren Daniels, alias Warren Mooney, sent up for life from King county on May 27, 1922, on a charge of murder; Ernest Brown, alias Ernie Whitey, in April, 1922, sentenced to 10 to 30 years for burglary, from Clallam county; and Frank Holmes, alias Martin Flynn, sentenced in January, 1920, from King county, 16 to 20 years for robbery.

AIR SERVICE CHARGES ARE REITERATED

Mitchell Says He Is Ready To Prove Government Negligence; Instances Are Enumerated.

Washington, Nov. 9.—(A.P.)—Another reverberating cannonade of accusations was turned loose today by Colonel William Mitchell against those in charge of the military and naval air services.

Through his counsel, Representative Frank H. Reid, the colonel informed the court martial trying him because of his previous utterances in the air controversy that he was fully prepared to prove his charge of criminal and almost treasonable negligence in government aviation.

Among the multitude of offenses of which the defense counsel promised to furnish proof were these:
That the Shenandoah went on her fatal western trip unfit and against the will of her commander, Zachary Lansdowne.
That a naval officer sought to have Lansdowne's widow give false testimony.

That those who arranged the unsuccessful flight of the PN-9, No. 1, were "incompetent."
That high army and navy officers had testified falsely before committees of congress.

That Colonel Mitchell himself "was deceived and transferred because he told the truth."
That government aviators are put to unnecessary hazards and many killed as a result.

That the government has failed to thwart a project to give a foreign flight organization a foothold near the Panama canal and have provided adequate air protection to Hawaii and the Philippines.

"Army aeronautics is gradually waiting itself away under the present administration of the war department," said the statement of the defense counsel.

"We will prove that Colonel Mitchell, after exhausting every usual means to safeguard the aerial defense of the United States, without result, took the only way possible that would cause a study of the true conditions of the national defense to be made."

"We will prove that the bulk of the equipment in the army air service at the present time is either obsolete and obsolescent."

Each session of the cooking school is going to be crowded with surprises and valuable hints on cards containing each day's program, together with the receipts used will be distributed to the women attending these classes. A different program will be presented each day.

At least two contests will be worked out whereby the women of Salem and vicinity will be eligible to win the Hotpoint Range on which the school's cooking is done. Other prizes will include electric floor lamp, electric toaster, canned goods, Crico, and many other prizes of which a full detail will be given when the feature is fully worked out.

There will be no reserved seats. It will be a case of first come first served but arrangements have been made to make everyone comfortable. Music will be furnished by the Sherman-Clay company for an hour before the school starts.

PROPERTY AT LIBERTY AND STATE IS SITE

First National To Start Work of \$450,000 Building Next June; Present Tenants Vacate.

Announcement was made by officers of the First National bank this morning that arrangements have been completed whereby they will go ahead next summer with the erection of a skyscraper bank building of from eight to ten stories in height at State and Liberty streets. The new property will represent an outlay of \$450,000 or more, the building itself to represent an investment of \$200,000 and ground and equipment of \$150,000 more. Under an agreement reached between the parties, Pomeroy & Keene and other leaseholders in the new property will vacate by June 15, and work of raising the old structure will start at once, thereafter.

Was Rodgers' Plan.
This announcement comes as a realization of a dream of the late George F. Rodgers, former president of the bank, who was killed in an airplane accident last year. Directors of the bank already have made arrangements with architects to prepare the first prospective drawings of the proposed new structure and in addition arrangements are being made for plans for interior arrangements and fixtures, which officers declare to be their hope, will be better than anything now between Portland and San Francisco.

The exact height of the building is still a little indefinite. Officers say it will be an eight-story structure at least, but according to plans now incubating may be raised to a full 10 stories in height by the time definite building is under way.

Two Entrances on State.
Present plans contemplate two entrances on State street, one for the bank and one for the building. It is probable arrangements will be made between the bank and Frank Myers of the Spa for a joint use of the stairway which now runs up between the Spa and the Red Cross Pharmacy. Property to be used by the bank reaches to the corner of the stairway and it is understood that the stairway will be made to suit construction of the new building for such joint use, which will permit entrance on the second floor over the Spa as well as to the new bank building upstairs.

The bank contemplates installation of two fast elevators in the building, the most modern and swiftest obtainable.

Make Modern Bank.
The fixtures in the bank will be new throughout. In addition entirely new vaults will be installed and the safety deposit vault, officers of the institution state, will be the most modern attainable and something entirely new in the line of safety vaults on the coast. While plans are still in incubation, bank officials have had architects examining bank building conditions generally everywhere so that when the structure is built it will contain as nearly as possible every modern banking feature and

Crawford Resigns As Superintendent of Prison Flax Plant

Robert Crawford resigned today as superintendent of the flax industry at the state penitentiary, and Governor Pierce said that John J. Quinlan, prison engineer, would now be in full charge of all industries at the penitentiary, including the flax and farm industries. The governor refused to make further comment on the change except to say: "I'm not going to have any further clashing of authority at the penitentiary."

The change was announced by the governor immediately after a very brief conference in his office early this morning with Crawford and Deputy Warden J. L. Little. The latter is acting warden during the absence of Warden A. M. Dalrymple, who is visiting eastern prisons and attending a national prison conference.

The governor said that Crawford would remain in the employ of the flax department. He has been superintendent since the beginning of the Pierce administration and also served in that capacity for a time under the Wilby and Ott administration.

BREAD 27 YEARS OLD FOUND HERE

A piece of bread 27 years old is exhibited by G. F. Sherwood of Salem. The bread was baked at the state hospital for the insane in 1898 and is still in good condition except where insects have invaded it.
